SEVEN SHOT TO DEATH

CHESTER, Pa.—Seven persons were shot to death and four others were wounded today by a man who then shot himself to death when trapped by police. Witnesses said the man leaped from an automobile in the downtown section and fatally wounded Ellery Purnsley, city detective, who was on his way to work. As bystanders rushed to the aid of detectives, the man opened fire, killing six other persons and wounding four more. The man has not yet been identified.

MURDER IN SWANK HOTEL

NEW YORK-Ralph Edward Barrow, 19-yearold Michigan salesman, has confessed, police reported today, to the murder of Colin Cameron MacKellar, 56-year-old Montreal textile executive. MacKellar was beaten today in his Canadian Club suite in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel early Friday. A book of matches found in the suite was the major clue in tracing the murderer. Robbery may have been the motive of slaying.
