Woman Dies In City Jail

An inquest was begun this afternoon into the death in the city jail Tuesday of Mrs. Hazel Stacey, who died in her sleep, apparently from natural causes. Her death was noted by other women prisoners in the women's section of the jail.

Mrs. Stacey, whose age was 30, was serving a sentence after pleading guilty to two charges of supplying liquor to Indians. She had been sentenced to pay a \$50 fine on each charge or serve a month in jail.

Apparently the woman died during the night but it was not noted until late Tuesday morning when another prisoner attempted to waken her. Previously, it had been thought that she was asleep.

Dr. R. E. Coleman held an autopsy last night and an inquest was set for this afternoon by Coroner M. M. Stephens.

To Receive Repair Here

The twin screw motor vessel Southeastern which went aground Monday on Hunter Island, north of Queen Charlotte Sound, later refloating and docking here at 9 o'clock yesterday morning with a 300-ton cargo, will have her damaged hull repaired at the Prince Rupert dry dock.

The Southeastern, owned by Briggs Steamship Co., is making a charter trip to Alaska with emergency supplies from Seattle. Her destination is Cordova across the Gulf of Alaska.

The Southeastern will be taken out of the water onto the pontoons at the dry dock tomorrow morning when the exact extent of damage to her bow will be ascertained.

It is not expected it will be necessary to remove the Southeastern's cargo.

The repairs will be speeded so that no more time than is absolutely necessary will be lost in getting in with her delivery of much needed food supplies.

MERCY FLIGHT IN INTERIOR

BURNS LAKE—Russ Baker landed at Burns Lake Monday bringing Billy McNeill, manager of the Circle Guides of Tweedsmuir Park, to hospital suffering from a severe attack of appendicitis. He was suddenly stricken while camped at a wilderness lake some forty miles from the beaten path but a local Indian lost no time in getting word to Ootsa Lake and Russ Baker responded promptly in the emergency.

Billy McNeill was operated on by Doctor Holmes almost immediately after his arrival as infection was threatening. The operation was a success and the patient is resting comfortably.

Log Cabin Born Southern Boy for Vice-President

Senator Alben William Barkley, 70-year-old political veteran born in a log cabin at Paducah, Ky., Nov. 24, 1877, Democratic wheelhorse and a member of every Congress since the 63rd in 1913, is President Truman's vice-presidential running-mate in the United States election.

Barkley, heavy-set but youthful for his years, worked his way through school and college to become a lawyer and entered politics in 1905, conducting his first campaign—as candidate for prosecuting attorney—on mule back through the Kentucky Hills.

He was elected to the House of Representatives in 1913 and held his seat until 1927 when he was elected to the Senate. He has remained solidly entrenched there ever since.

Barkley was majority Senate leader through the Roosevelt regime and up to the Republican Congressional victory in 1946. Then he became minority leader.

He was "dear Alben" to Roosevelt through the tough "New Deal" period and broke with his leader only once: when he helped

override the presidential veto of a war veterans' bonus bill. He resigned as majority leader but was quickly reinstated and soon made his peace with Roosevelt.

Barkley is a deep-chested man with a powerful voice and eloquent tongue—an impressive old-style orator. He likes to tell stories and will sing "My Old Kentucky Home" or "Wagon Wheels" without too much persuasion, or play the mouth organ. He is a widower with three children, drives his own car, entertains often and lives moderately and temperately.

Western Powers Seek Atomic Showdown

Three Blunt Questions Are Put Before Russia

Meantime Discussion of Berlin Blockade Goes On With Russians Sitting In Though They Are Not Participating

PARIS (CP)—British, United States and French United Nations Security Council leaders met late today to hammer out a resolution calling on Russia to end the Berlin blockade, a British official said. Hector McNeil, British minister of state, addressed three blunt questions to Russia on the issue of international control of atomic energy:

1. Will you agree that a fully effective system of control should take effect before a United Nations convention banning the bomb?
2. Will you accept majority-backed proposals for atomic control as a general basis for the establishing of a world control system?
3. Will you agree to abandon the veto in the operation of the proposed international control agency?

McNeil told Soviet Russia that Great Britain and the United States would not agree to hand over information on the atom bomb or atomic energy stocks because "we all fear Russia." He said that an international control agency would be set up to control atomic energy and that the Soviet and its supporters in the Atomic Energy Commission. An adequate inspection system should be built up, he said, "if we are to succeed the world from this fear that inhibits all normal economic and cankers all our normal international relations."

Russia's Andrei Vishinsky, first showing interest and then boredom, sat in silence on the United Nations opening debate on the Berlin crisis today. The Soviet deputy foreign minister announced that he would not participate. He seemed interested, however, when United States Delegate Phillip C. Jessup said the United States was "determined to take such measures as may be necessary to insure safety and subsistence of our forces in Berlin and the population to their charge by the Four-Power agreement."

COMINFORM MEET HELD IN GERMANY

BERLIN, (CP)—The United States military government's official German newspaper said today that a meeting of the Cominform was held recently in Dessau in the Soviet zone of Germany. German communist leaders attended, Die Beue Zeitung said. One major item was the attitude in event of open conflict.

TEHERAN, Iran—Two hundred persons were killed and thousands were injured by an earthquake at midnight last night, a dispatch from Meshed said today. The damage was reported great. The dispatch said that parts of the famous Meshed mosque had collapsed. Meshed is the capital of Khorsan Province in Eastern Iran.

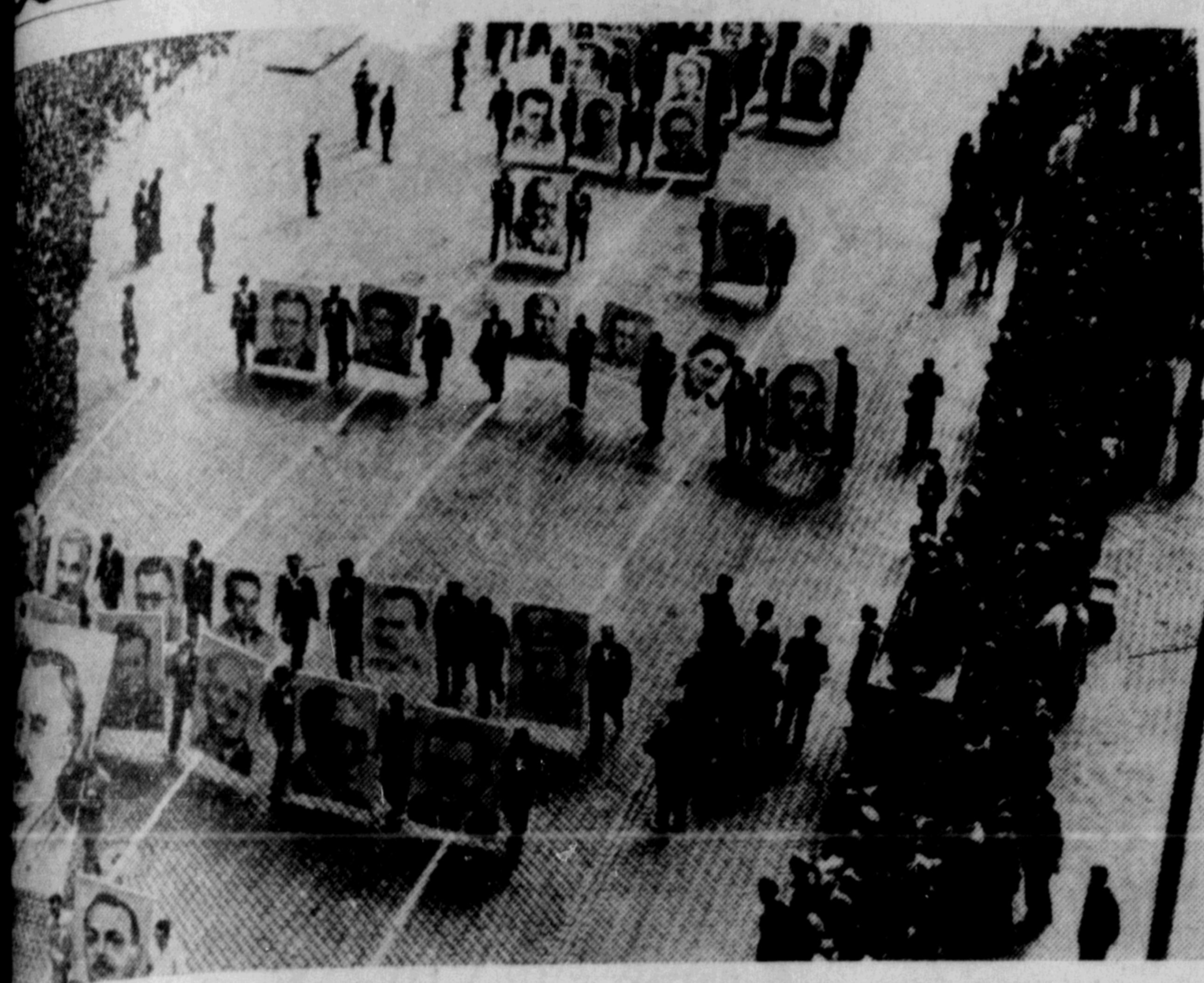
Synopsis

Emanuel Shinwell Speaks to British Miners

CLAYCROSS, Eng. —Minister for War, Emanuel Shinwell told a meeting of miners here that "there is no danger of war at the present time. While Britain's purpose is to promote peace, we cannot ignore the need for preparing the most adequate defence for our people." He could not understand the alarm about the call-up of reservists. "Some had the idea that everybody would be called up."

"We are not going to do anything of the sort," he stated.
