DESIGN-OF-THE-MONTH-Here is a plan with features that make it desirable and practical for location on a rural or suburban lot when the owner has planned to have a garden and wants direct access to the basement and also the bathroom without entering other rooms within the house. The kitchen is located at the front. A serving counter and cabinets form the end of the dining space in the living-dining room, making it possible to set the dining table and remove the dishes without leaving the kitchen. The first floor contains two bedrooms and a bath with adequate closet space. The second floor may be finished at a later date to include two additional bedrooms.

The roof construction is simple and the stair is so arranged that no dormer is required. Designed by M. G. Dixon, B.Arch., M.R.A.I.C., Ottawa, the area of the house for estimating purposes is 1,120 square feet, including second floor. The exterior dimensions are 30 feet by 24 feet and the minimum required lot width is 42 feet without driveway.

### IMPORTANCE OF WHEAT

C.N.R. Trophy Presented at Royal Agricultural Fair in Toronto

TORONTO- The opening of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair yesterday was marked by the presentation by R. C. Vaughan C.M.G., chairman and president, Canadian National Railways, of the new C.N.R. Challenge Trophy for the world's' championship in wheat. The trophy, which is for annual competition, was received by J. A. Northey, president of the Fair on behalf of the diretcors. In making the presentation, Mr. Vaughan stressed the value of wheat and agricultural products to the national economy and pointed out that wheat had assumed a new and vital role in the world"s war recovery program. He said that the national system felt privileged to participate in any effort to improve and stimulate wheat production

Mr. Northey stated that the Canadian National Trophy was typical of the great railway organization which had served the wheat growers so faithfully throughout the years. Evidence of the interest taken in the trophy and of its stimulation to the wheat growers, Mr. Northey said, was already reflected in the number of entries received by the fair this year. 


