**SCOTSMEN OR NORSE**

Gyro Club Hears Some Ancient History About Canadians

Harold Rindall is a Workmen's Compensation Board official but he has also delved deeply into Scottish history and it was to be gathered from what he told the Prince Rupert Gyro Club in a luncheon talk yesterday that Scotsmen, or the most of them at least, are really Norsemen. The backbone of the Scottish people were the Scots (originally Kelts) who came over from Ireland, and the Norsemen, who came from Scandinavia. The principal traits of the Scottish people were their shrewdness, which was to be traced to their Celtic forebears, and their love of independence and fighting spirit to the Norse. The Scottish tongue and language was strong in its Norse influence and many Scottish names were nothing more than Norse with "Mac" put in front of them. The oldest Scottish clan—the McLeods—was founded by the Norsemen. The McDonalds, "Lord of the Isles," were purely Norse. The Frasers, on the other hand, were originally French and the Stewart's came from Normandie, their original name being Fitzhugh which was changed after arrival.

Mr. Rindall's talk was couched in humorous vein and was listened to with much interest by the service club members and one guests in the person of Ald.
