NEW YORK (CP)—Three Canadians were seized by federal agents last night at a world peace conference meeting here. The three men and a woman—were taken into custody by eight immigration agents on orders of the Department of Justice. They are held for questioning on their immigration status.

### Would Arrest Ernie Dalskog

Latest Move in Connection With I.W.A.'s \$130,000

VANCOUVER (CP)—A. T. R. Campbell, counsel for the International Woodworkers of America (I.W.A.), sought court permission yesterday for the arrest of Ernie Dalskog, former president of the I.W.A. in British Columbia. He seeks a writ of attachment from the Supreme Court, charging Dalskog with non-payment of \$130,000 to a court receiver.

Dalskog and Harold Pritchett last October 3 led a swift disaffiliation move from the I.W.A. and formed the rebel Woodworkers' Industrial Union of Canada of which Pritchett is now president. A Supreme Court order, appointing the district registrar as receiver for British Columbia I.W.A. funds, directed that all money and property be turned over to the receiver.

The \$130,000, it is alleged, was collected as an I.W.A. strike fund under Dalskog's direction.

### Cambridge Is Winner

LONDON (CP)—Cambridge raced from behind to win the ninety-fifth Oxford-Cambridge boat race by a quarter of a length today before a huge crowd lining and encircling the Thames course.

The victory today was the fifty-first for Cambridge in the classic event which has been held off and on since 1829. Oxford has won 43 times with one dead heat.

### Trapp Tech Eliminates Rupert In Hoop Series

Locals Take Heart-Breaking Defeat Gamely—Vancouver College Also In Final

VANCOUVER (CP)—Trapp Technical School of New Westminster did it again last night as they did two years ago. They sidelined Bo-Me-Hi Rainmakers of Prince Rupert in the semi-finals of the British Columbia inter-High School basketball championship contest. The score was 31 to 27 and the game was as

hard fought as the count indicated. It was a heart-breaking loss for the northern lads but they took it gamely.

Equally close was the other bracket of the semi-finals in which Vancouver College eased past Pentiction by a score of 37 to 32.

Trapp Tech and Vancouver College meet tonight in the final to wind up the series. Prince Rupert meets Pentiction for third place.

In the consolation series last night Duke of Connaughts, of New Westminster defeated King George of Vancouver 39 to 27 and West Vancouver won over Powell River 36 to 28.

The consolation final will also be played tonight.

Trapp Tech knew they'd been in a struggle before they finally prevailed over Prince Rupert's rugged Booth Memorial High School quintet. Actually Rudy Wiley's lads outplayed and outshot the northcoasters throughout but they were off their shooting form which helped to keep Prince Rupert in the running. Rube, with nine, and Hanley, with seven, were high scorers for Trapp.

In the hard-fought close game no team was ever leading by more than four points. Prince Rupert, playing cautiously, was behind 8 to 9 at the quarter.

The game went slowly, Trapp having the edge in the second quarter. Prince Rupert at one point led 16 to 14. Trapp pressed in the third quarter and took back the lead but Prince Rupert came back to tie and then regain the lead 23 to 21.

Trapp took the lead finally with seconds remaining and led by two points. However, the Rainmakers could not get the tying points, Trapp scoring again with the bell.

Spring and Flaten were tops in scoring, playing aggressively but losing on the rebounds which hurt their chances. Spring bagged eleven points, Flaten 7.

### WARNS GOV'T OF UNEMPLOYMENT

C.C.L. Makes Its Annual Submission at Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP)—Warning that unemployment is striking Canada, the Canadian Congress of Labor Friday called on the government to enlarge its "rainy day" public works program and immediately put it into operation to provide work.

In its annual legislative submission to the cabinet, the 360,000-man Canadian Congress of Labor also urged government action on housing, lower taxes, renewed price controls, measures against inflation and deflation, extension of the federal labor code, social security measures and legislation in a wide range of other labor and social matters.

### Patricide In Slaying Alleged

Prominent Vancouver Island Business Man Shot to Death in Store

DUNCAN, Vancouver Island, M. Winter Cook, prominent local merchant and president of the Duncan Chamber of Commerce, was shot dead in his store here at 5:30 last evening. Five shots from a 25-calibre automatic pistol were pumped into his body. His 23-year-old son, Douglas Cook, has been charged with murder.

Cook was proprietor of Westwell's dealers in confectionary, fancy goods, china and toys.

### HOUSEBREAKING IS ADMITTED

Two men were remanded for sentence in city police court Friday after they pleaded guilty to a series of breakings and enterings of city residences. One of the men also pleaded guilty to a charge of robbery with violence, loot from which amounted to 60 cents.

Wilfred Brass, a recent arrival from the prairies and Fred White, a native, pleaded guilty to four charges of breaking and entering, two at the King Tai rooms and two at cabins on Fraser Street Wednesday night.

Brass also pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering the cabin of E. J. Maloney, Wantage Road, and theft of a radio. The radio was later recovered by police.

Brass entered a plea of guilty to a charge of robbery with violence against Mr. Maloney. He forcibly took a sum of money, amounting to about 60 cents from his victim.

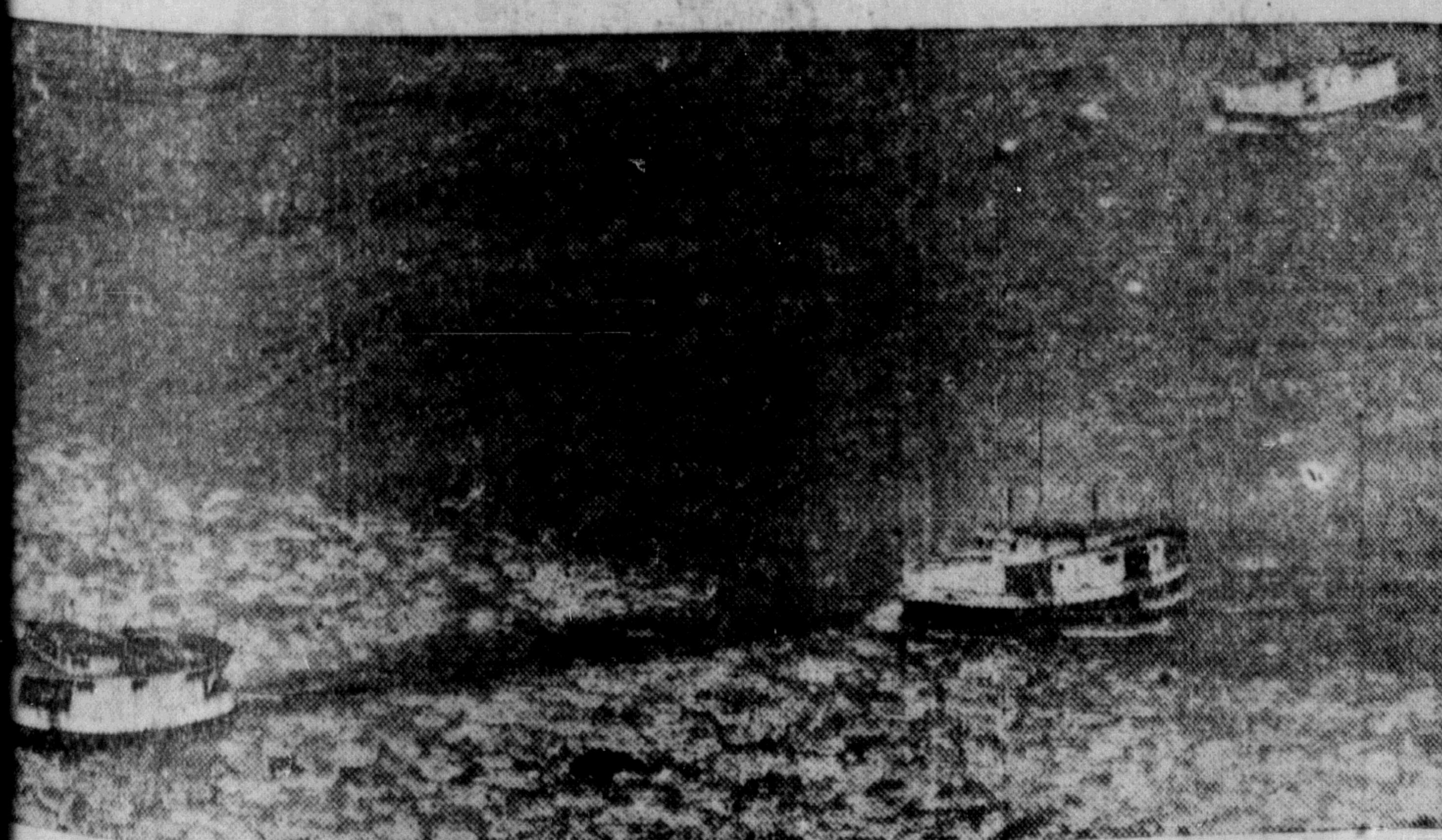

### INCIDENT ON MAGNIFICENT

ABOARD H.M.C.S. MAGNIFICENT (CP)—Investigation is being conducted aboard the Canadian aircraft carrier Magnificent into an incident in which 32 ratings failed to heed a call to muster on the flight deck, it was announced today.

The incident occurred March 21 as the Magnificent, in company with ships of the Canadian and Royal Navy, plied the Caribbean Sea enroute to Cuba.

The 32 aircraft control ratings disregarded an order to indicate their apparent disgruntlement with some of the conditions aboard the carrier.

### Better Deal For Vets

Bernard M. Isman, British Columbia Command president of the Canadian Legion, told a meeting of the Prince Rupert branch last night that while "you are members of a very large organization, I frankly don't think that we have the power that we should have."

The Vancouver barrister who is regional head of the veterans' group, flew here Friday afternoon to attend the meeting at which he installed Prince Rupert branch officers for 1949-50. He delivered an address following the installation ceremonies.

Membership in the Canadian Legion across the country totals 300,000, of which 31,000 paid-up members are in British Columbia, he said. This figure could be expanded to 40,000.

"I want you to know that anything I say about our governments or government departments is not said in a political manner," he declared. "We should forget politics in the Canadian Legion. However, I insist on our right to criticize the government in our struggle to get better conditions for our comrades."

He told that the primary duty of Second World War veterans is "to see that War Veterans Allowance recipients get a square deal—which they never have done."

Basic rates, which now stand at \$85 a month for married recipients and \$50 monthly for single men, should be sharply increased and the Legion will continue to insist that the schedule be increased to an amount considered adequate.

Mr. Isman criticized the provincial government for its failure to revise the Liquor Act to reduce the license fees which Legion clubs pay on a gallonage basis for beer. Some clubs pay up to \$1000 a year merely for license fees.

The most important factor in the Canadian Legion, he asserted is not the Dominion or provincial commands, but the local branch, which has duties not only toward ex-servicemen and women, but to the community in which it exists.

"We must show people that the Legion is not only ready to aid ex-servicemen but that it also is ready to take a full part in the affairs of the community. Mr. Isman paid tribute to John S. Wilson, Prince Rupert zone commander, and to charter members of the Prince Rupert branch, which was founded in 1926.

Mr. Wilson acted as chairman prior to the installation of officers and introduced Mr. Isman. Following the meeting, there were refreshments and musical entertainment.

### RUSSIAN HERO WINS NATIONAL

Former Mayor of Toronto Gets \$100,000

AINTREE, England (CP)—Russian Hero romped home ahead of Roimond and Royal Mount today to win the 103rd running of the Grand National Steeplechase.

Russian Hero is owned by W. F. Williamson and ridden by L. McMorrow. He was 66 to 1 in the betting.

The Daily Worker, the British Communist party's official paper, selected the nine-year old gelding to win the race.

A field of 43 horses started in the classic, the world's most famous and gruelling steeplechase.

Cromwell, the favorite, finished fourth, dashing the hopes of the jockey-peer, Lord Mildmay, of besting a jinx that has snatched a Grand National victory from him twice before.

Russian Hero was fully eight lengths ahead of Roimond at the finish. Lord Bicester's Roimond was quoted at 22 to 1 and the third place Royal Mount, owned by Mrs. M. Harvey, started at 18 to 1.

### SWEETSTAKE WINNERS

Three Canadians, two from Toronto and another from Kinley, Saskatchewan, each won \$100,000 in the sweepstakes. The big winners were W. S. Cowley, grain elevator employee at Kinley, Saskatchewan, 30 miles west of Saskatoon; George Greig, 26-year old Toronto jewelry firm employee, and Ralph Day, former mayor of Toronto.

Twenty Canadians, and possibly more, are known to have held tickets on horses which failed to place. They will get \$470 each.

Three top prizes in the Army and Navy Sweepstake of Quebec went to residents of the United States.

Bruce Kerr, 67-year old Burns Lake man, drew two horses but they failed to place.

### TENSION NOW OFF IN COAL FIELDS

PITTSBURG (CP)—Tension is off today in the American coal fields and in the industries which depend upon coal for operation following the order of John L. Lewis to his miners to return to the pits Monday, thus ending a two-week work stoppage of 463,000 members of United Mine Workers in the pits east of the Mississippi.

### PAPER IS FINED, EDITOR IS JAILED

Contempt of Court Found In Old Country Murder Trial

LONDON (CP)—The High Court yesterday fined the proprietors of the London Daily Mirror \$40,000 for contempt of court and ordered the editor, Silverstar Bolan, to be detained in prison for three months.

The contempt consisted of an article published in the Mirror which was held to prejudice the trial of John Haigh, 39-year-old company director, charged with the murder of Mrs. Olive Durand-Beacon, rich elderly widow who disappeared from a London hotel. The Daily Mirror had alleged that Haigh was guilty of "murder after murder."
