trunks, and new additions do not have to be placed side by side with present switchboard if room is not sufficient, because the multiples or trunks make it possible to install at any convenient position.

No manufacturing firm supplying the automatic equipment will make any allowance for salvage of present switchboard equipment and telephone instruments. This would be a total loss.

According to the data submitted to City Council by your utility committee, the rate of interest on a \$550,000 bond issue at 4% on a 20-year issue will amount to \$22,000 per annum. Sinking fund will be \$27,500 per annum and operating costs will amount to approximately \$31,000 per year, making a total of \$80,500 which must be provided to take care of the plant. Based on your revenue of 1927 of \$62,419, and allowing \$3 per month per phone for the 277 applications you now have on hand this would increase your revenue \$9,372 a year making your total annual revenue \$71,791 or an operating loss of \$8,709 per year. Moreover, the \$31,000 shown above is based on your lowest yearly operating cost for the automatic plant.

I can assure you I am standing on firm ground, and have no hesitation in stating the automatic is not financially possible on sound business or engineering lines, and am convinced a proper and thorough check-up of your plant will bear out my statement that a proper survey should be carried out before entering upon a large expenditure of this kind.

FINE CONCERT BY ORCHESTRA

Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra last night presented what undoubtedly was the best concert of its young career in a benefit performance at the Civic Centre in aid of the Film Council. The orchestral choies achieved a happy balance between audience interest and the ability of a musical body of limited size to successfully perform.

Conductor Neville Gerrard and his instrumentalists are to be congratulated on the progress of their accomplishments and commended on the choice of program, both of which are indications of advancing experience in orchestral work.

The audience of 400 was lavish in its acclaim of the eight orchestral groups which composed the program. The selections ranged through the lighter musical gamut of a Rossini overture, minuets by Mozart and Paderewski, popular light operatic selections by Victor Herbert, a descriptive intermezzo by Albert W. Ketelby, a lyrical Strauss waltz, a slow, rich Netherlands folk song and nostalgic songs of Scotland.

A really satisfying musical experience was a trumpet solo, "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice" from the Saint-Saens opera "Sampson and Delilah" played by George Brown, with full orchestral accompaniment. With fine certainty and purity of tone, Mr. Brown delivered the aria which, although originally written for contralto voice, has become a well-known trumpet solo.

Mrs. George E. Sendall's vocal rendition of the brooding "Blind Plowman" by M. Radcliffe-Hall and "Keep On

Hopin'" by F. Stanton won enthusiastic audience acceptance. Mrs. Sendall has an unusually fine mezzo-soprano voice. Her accompanist was Mrs. J. C. Gilker, the orchestral pianist. At the conclusion of the solos, Mrs. Sendall and Mrs. Gilker were presented with bouquets by Mr. Gerrard.

Master of ceremonies was F. E. Anfield while William McKenzie and Joseph Graisel were in charge of the door. Funds raised through the concert will be used to purchase a film projector by the film council. Over \$200 was realized.
