SAVOYS WIN CLOSE GAME

Consolidated Hold in Senior Honors—Port Edward and Bo-Me-Hi Victors

Savoys consolidated their position at the top of the city basketball senior "A" league framework Saturday night by defeating Brownwoods 46-38 in the Civic Centre gym after a slow start that saw the shoemen take a dominant position until half time.

In the two intermediate league games, Port Edward defeated Morgan's 37-27 and Bo-Me-Hi overcame Fashion Footwear 34-22 while in the Junior League, Stone's overran High School by a 31-15 score.

Mel Thompson and Reg Lavigne of Brownwoods set a pace that brought the shoemen 11 points during the first quarter. This gave them a seven point lead that had diminished to five at half time and to a five-point deficit at the three-quarter time whistle.

Savoy broke loose in the third quarter when Rupert Holkestad trained his sights on the hoop and dropped in four baskets and two free throws for 10 points. Holkestad was top scorer of the game with 17 points, netting two in each of the first two quarters, 10 in the third and three in the fourth.

The energetic start made by Brownwoods inspired a measure of hope in the fans that here at last was a victory for the underdog shomen but, as usual, they failed to carry out the promise. Thompson led the scoring for Brownwoods with nine points, followed by Lavigne with eight.

Port Edward's victory over Morgan's provokes the thought that if the suburbanites had got into the conflict last fall instead of at mid-season, their true standing in the Intermediate League would have been a definite threat to the other teams, including Bo-Me-Hi. The visitors have made a good showing every time they have played.

High score for Port Edward was T. Venn, with nine points. Lien of Morgan's marked up 8 points for his team.

In the other Intermediate series game, Bo-Me-Hi continued its unbroken series of victories by sweeping over Fashion Footwear in the fourth quarter after trailing them during the greater part of the first three periods. The two teams reached three-quarter time with a 20-20 tie.

Shier and Scherk of Bo-Me-Hi shared top scoring honors with 12 points each while Vukovich was heavy marksman for Fashion Footwear. His three baskets in the first quarter gave the shoemen their lead which they held until late in the game.

In the Junior game, Stone's led the striving High School team in all of the four quarters of a game that was unique because of its large number of free throws. In the second and third quarters, High School scored 12 successive free throws. Simundsen scored four and emerged with a record of 12 points tops for his team.

Sports fans in general and sports columnists in particular are not especially distinguished as a group whose members care to admit they were wrong—even if their home team wins contrary to predictions. While nobody is really unhappy that

Canada's Olympic hockey team showed its heels to the rest of the world at St. Moritz, columnists from coast to coast are still regarding the feat as "an exceptional upset" or concluding from the results that Europe's teams were given too much of an advance build-up and were not solid competition.

Among those who don't have to back-pedal now are Ottawa Railbirds who saw just enough

of the final team before it left the capital to get an inkling of its potentialities. "The present team is in no way comparable to the squad that looked so bad against McGill and army headquarters," writes Tommy Shields of the Ottawa Citizen. "Any idea that the showing made against McGill in an exhibition game here is a true valuation of the present team's ability should be thrown away."

What many forget is that after that McGill game, Ottawa's leading team in the Senior Ottawa City League—New Edinburgh—donated five players: Reg Schroeter, Ab Renaud, Pete Lechnitz, Ted Hibberd and Frank Dunster, all regulars in the winning Olympic team.

Murray Dowey, Wally Halder and George Mara, who starred overseas, cost their Toronto Commercial League team a number of certain wins.

"We do not hold the opinion," says Shields, "that any one part of Canada can lay claim to any special distinction for the Flyers' Olympic triumph. While three outstanding players were added from Toronto, that was just a

circumstance. A like equally-effective player have been added to other city.
