**Aluminum Plant—
In Southeast Alaska;
Power From Northern B.C.**

VANCOUVER (CP)—The Vancouver Sun says dispatch from Victoria that preliminary surveys have been carried out this summer for another hydro-aluminum development "using some of British Columbia's vast water resources."

"The Aluminum Company of America," the dispatch says, "is planning to send a team to study problems of power, which covers the far western tip of B.C. and a part of Yukon and Alaska." Lake and Tagish Lake in western B.C. would be the sources of water. Bennett Lake in the Yukon would be part of the system. The plant would be built across the south of Whitehorse and back water for storage. The Sun adds, "Just what effect this may have on Aluminum Company of Canada's big project in Tweedsmuir Park area is not clear. In the case of B.C.'s only benefit would be water rentals."

Conditions on Railway Dangerous as Yet
Flood conditions but a slide in the Mount Robson area has come out of the cause of delay. The slide was the cause of delay in the train from the East, due at 10:15 p.m., but it was not until 12:15 a.m. that the train was brought in. The slide near the Fraser River at George and east has been considerably. C. A. Berner, general superintendent, said that it is still twenty feet below the level of the Fraser River at George, six inches below at Prince George.

Fraser River water has been from four inches at Amstutz to 14 inches at Pacific. The water is still well above level. Bulkley River has been dropping. Warm weather could bring floods as there is much water on the mountain but there is hope that there are no serious floods.

Loggers' Strike Imminent; Last Date For Settlement Is Nearing

Final Meetings Today In Last Minute Effort To Avert Tie-Up

New Regulations to Relieve Heavy Third Avenue Traffic

Recommendation of a special committee on parking and traffic, presented to the city council last night, were approved as follows:
(1) That parking on Third Avenue between McBride and Seventh Street be limited to one hour between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. daily except Sunday.

75 Houses Per Year

To keep pace with what was being done in Vancouver, Prince Rupert should be building about 75 new houses every year, said J. D. McRae, M.L.A. for Prince Rupert, in speaking before the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council at its regular monthly meeting.

Housing was only one of several subjects which Mr. McRae discussed with the Trades and Labor Council which suspended its regular order of business in order to hear him. Mr. McRae felt that it was the responsibility of members of the legislature to represent the whole area of their constituency and not one organization. He, therefore, welcomed the opportunity to meet such organizations as the Trades and Labor Council to hear proposals they might have for new or amended legislation. Mr. McRae gave a detailed report on the matter of hospital insurance and stated that all were paying the same rates and that the scheme provided for the insuring of all people including old age pensioners. President H. S. Harrison thanked Mr. McRae for his attendance. The council voted the sum of \$25 to Manitoba flood relief. It was decided to hold another meeting June 18 to start arrangements for a Labor Day celebration.

Flood Relief Drive Ending

The Manitoba flood relief campaign will terminate officially Thursday, it was decided at the regular meeting of City Council last night. Ald. George Casey said that, since the council had taken the initiative in organizing the campaign, he thought the council should terminate it. He suggested the above date. He said that about \$2,500 had been collected, according to The Daily News, but that did not take into account what had been collected at places other than at the newspaper office and the City Hall. He thought the total amount would be much larger. It was unanimously agreed that the campaign end June 15 and that advertisements be placed asking canvassers to turn in their books and collections by that time.

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Garbage Service Being Improved

An extra garbage collection truck to pick up garbage in the business section at an estimated cost of \$50 per week wages and the operation of the truck for four hours a day, was approved by City Council at their regular meeting last night.

In presenting the report, Ald. J. N. Forman said there had been a joint meeting of the board of works and health committees with Dr. Duncan Black, director of Prince Rupert Health Unit, which had arrived at that solution. One swamper of the regular garbage crew would be used, he said, together with an additional driver and swamper. He thought additional revenue from the extra service would help pay the extra cost and that it would allow the regular garbage crew to give better service in residential areas.

Federal Labor Minister Makes Appeal To Parties

OTTAWA — Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, federal minister of labor, while stating that the dispute did not come within the jurisdiction of his department, today urged both sides in the loggers' strike dispute in British Columbia to make every effort to settle their differences and avert a strike. Speaking to the House of Commons, Mr. Mitchell said it was easy to get men out on the strike but it might be harder to get them back to work again.

VANCOUVER (CP)—Coast loggers, prepared to strike Thursday, reported no progress after an emergency meeting with operators and the provincial Labor Relations Board Monday. The parties are meeting again today.

"We heard no new proposal for settlement," said Tom MacKenzie, policy committee chairman of the I.W.A., representing 32,000 workers.

The union is asking a 17 cent an hour wage hike and a union shop. The conciliation board recommended a nine cents an hour boost and a maintenance of membership clause in the contract. "The strike deadline of Thursday still stands," said J. Stewart Aisbury, district I.W.A. president. "Today will tell the tale."

Vancouver Concern Given Job by Famous Players-Canadian Corporation
Construction of the Famous Players-Canadian Corporation new Totem Theatre, at the northwest corner of Third Avenue and First Street, which was suspended a few months ago, is about to be resumed.

J. H. Black, local manager, has received word that the contract has been let to Vancouver contracting firm of Dawson & Hall whose equipment is expected to reach the city any time now.

Fred Welch & Son, another Vancouver concern, have the contract for plumbing, heating and ventilation.

Inquest Set For Tonight

Inquest into the death of 63-year-old James Edward McLean, who was found shot through the right temple with a bullet from a 22-calibre rifle Saturday, will be held tonight with Deputy Coroner Bruce Stevens presiding.

McLean lived in a small cabin on Smith Island in the Skeena Slough across from North Pacific Cannery, about ten miles east of here and was found by neighbour Peter Peterson.

His death appeared as a case of suicide.

Resuming River Search Tomorrow

Having obtained a power barge from the Columbia Cellulose Co. and assembled dragging equipment, British Columbia Police will tomorrow resume operations in the Skeena River 55 miles east of Prince Rupert where an auto mobile is believed to have plunged into the river carrying William Gibb of Prince Rupert and Don Fraser sr. and Don Fraser jr. of Terrace to their deaths.
