Among Gold Producers of British Columbia

Operations in 1947 at the plant of the Polaris-Taku Mining Co. Ltd., at Tulsequah, in Northern British Columbia, show that the property now holds third place in the province, as a gold producer.

During last year the company produced 26,842 ounces of gold valued at \$939,461 from 89,793 tons for an average of 0.334 ounces of gold per ton. Grade has greatly increased. More labor has helped in the scope of production. There was an expenditure of \$621,444 on underground and surface work for the fiscal year ending April 30.

TERRACE DEAL IS CONFIRMED

Military Hospital Site Sold to Provincial Government

Disposal of the Terrace, British Columbia, military hospital unit and landsite has been officially confirmed by War Assets Corporation. The purchaser, the Government of British Columbia, acquired approximately 16.76 acres of land and seven surplus buildings including a hospital, nurses' quarters and mess, officers' quarters and mess, N.C.O.'s quarters and mess, boiler room and quartermaster's stores, and sundry portable sheds.

The Lands and Building Department of the Corporation previously disposed of several surplus Terrace buildings for demolition. Material salvaged from these operations provided substantial quantities of lumber and other useful material to builders in the area.

TENNESSEE BEAUTY FIRMLY DECLINES HOLLYWOOD OFFERS

"Love Is More Important" Says Barbara Jo Walker, Miss America of 1947

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Hollywood is still hounding Miss America of 1947 but the tall Tennessee beauty persistently declines all offers, because "love is more important."

"I only want to be a successful doctor's wife," says the nation's beauty queen, Barbara Jo Walker. This continues to amaze movieland and thousands of screen hopefuls.

Barbara's latest rejection slip went to David O. Selznick who asked her to discuss a contract with him in New York, all expenses paid, of course.

The producer received a courteous reply of refusal to this effect: "I'm simply not interested."

Her attitude is simple and, the way Barbara tells it, quite convincing:

"I have no desire to lead the type of life that you must in Hollywood. I have my own ideals and private life is what counts."

Barbara has made no attempt

to capitalize on the Miss America title. Although she averages about four personal appearances weekly, these are generally connected with charity. She has signed no advertising endorsements.

EDUCATION THE GOAL

Why did she enter the contest? Only for the \$5,000 scholarship fund. That award may be employed for any educational purpose. Last month she used some of the money to buy a piano to help with her music studies. She also will take graduate study in French and English through the fund.

Despite the many trips she's called on to make—fashion shows, carnivals, charity balls—she manages to keep pace with college classes at Memphis State here.

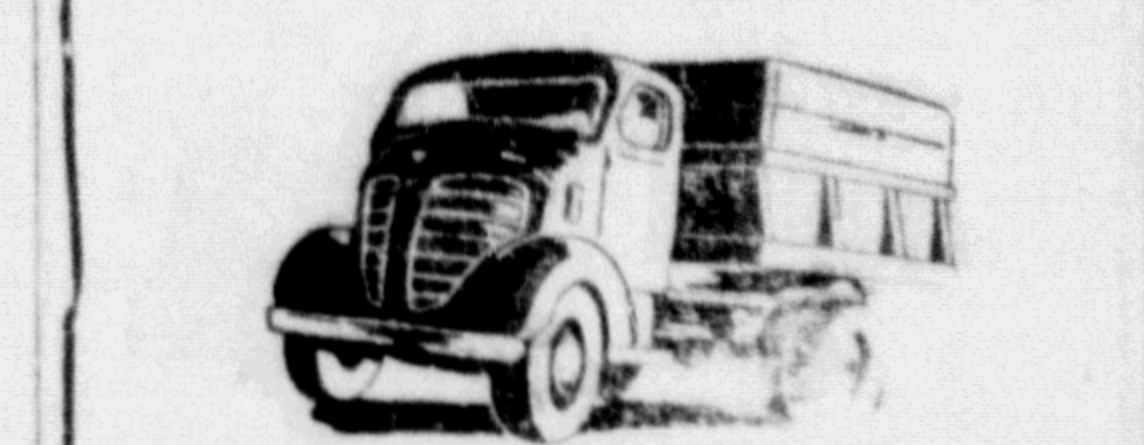
Taking books on the trips helps and she explains, "I got ahead (through summer courses). Now it's easy." Currently Barbara has a schedule calling for nine hours weekly study. The busy beauty finds time, for sorority work and roles in dramatic productions. Her interest in the stage goes no further.

She plans to teach school after she's graduated this spring. Later she'd like to become that "successful doctor's wife." He's John Hummel, of Clarkston, Mo., who recently completed medical school at the University of Tennessee here.
