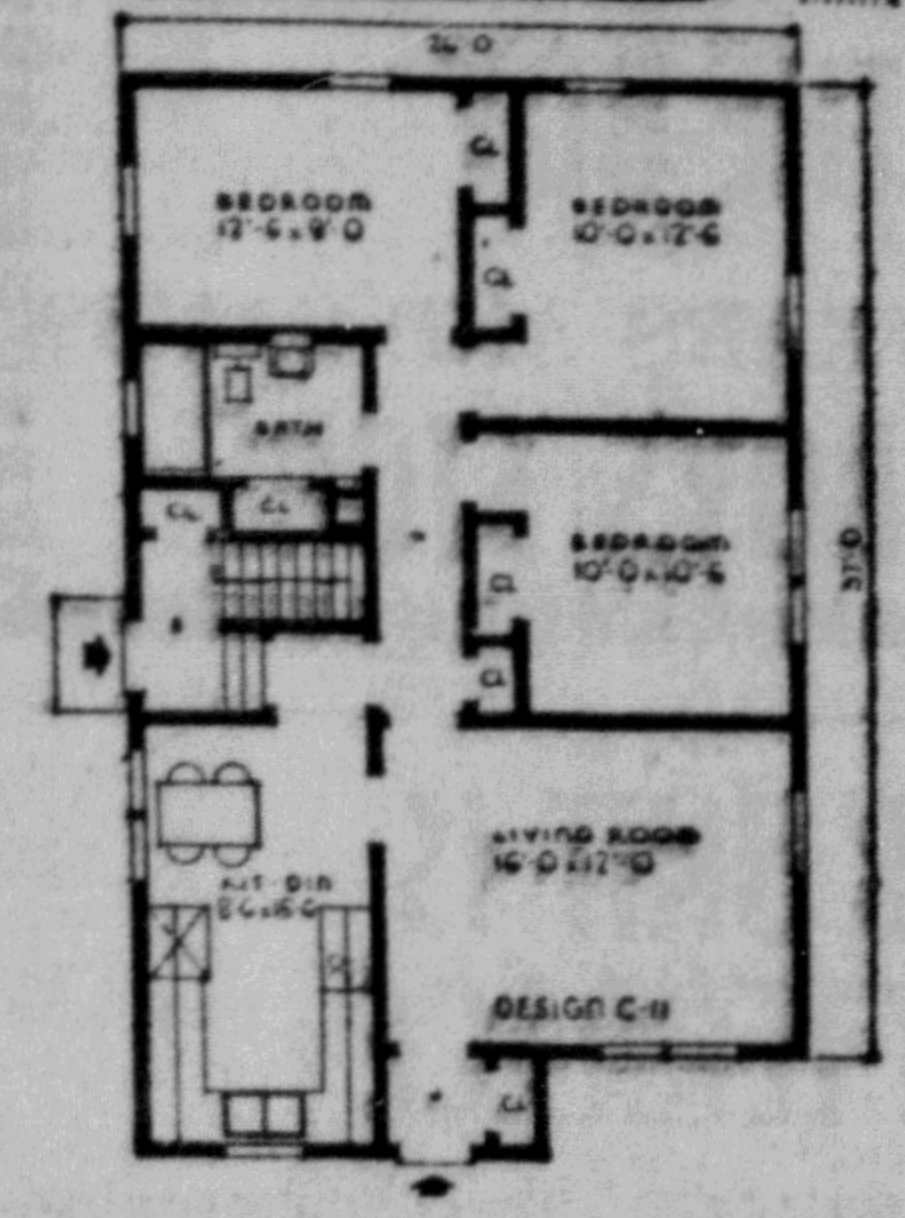
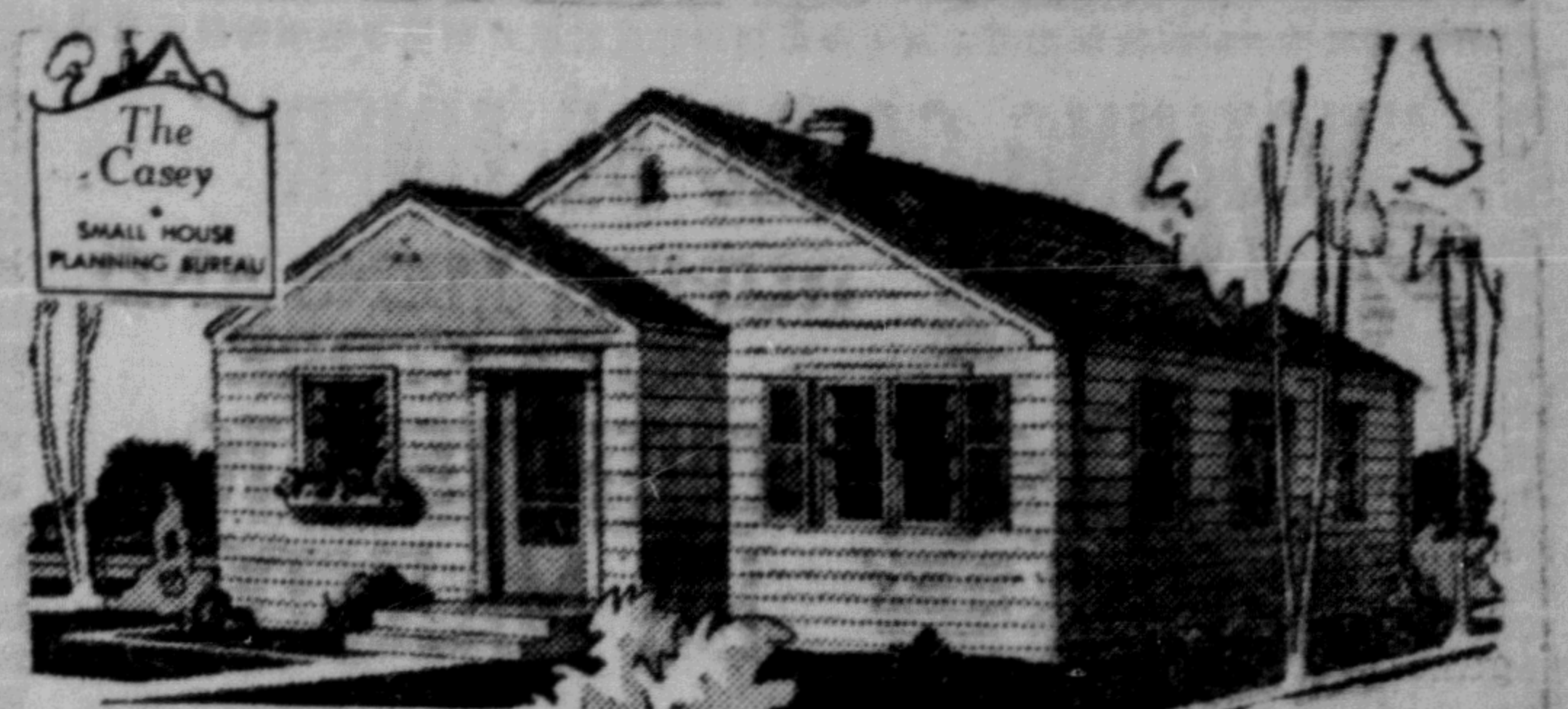
SHIPS and— WATERFRONT

Alaska Traffic Mounting—
Chris Parkvold Stricken—
U.S.S. Head Is Coming

Alaska traffic should provide a busy day on the local waterfront tomorrow extending into the week-end. Motorships Sidney, Dagney and Robert Eugene are all due tomorrow from southeastern Alaska, the first two bringing in canned salmon and the Robert Eugene, frozen fish. Also due by tomorrow is the Ocean Tow tug Shinn with the barge P.T. and B., arriving from Haines, Alaska, to pick up fourteen cars of perishable goods from the United States for delivery to Haines and delivery in refrigerated trucks over the Haines Cut-Off and Alaska Highway to central Alaska. Some of the fourteen cars have already arrived over the railway.

With a full list of passengers, including many round-trippers enjoying their cruise in north coast sunshine, C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. William Eccles, arrived in port at 1:15 this afternoon, from Vancouver, Westview and Ocean Falls, and will sail at midnight for Ketchikan when she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

G. McBean, managing director of Union Steamships Ltd., will be a visitor here during the coming week-end in the course of a northern inspection trip. He will arrive Friday afternoon on the Catala from Vancouver and transfer here to the steamer Chilcotin to make the round trip to the south Queen Charlotte



THE CASEY is a three-bedroom house suitable for a narrow lot. The liberal number of closets in this plan should delight the homemaker whose problem it is to find sufficient storage space. A closet at the grade entrance of The Casey and a general closet in the hall are available in addition to the

There is a large well-lighted dining area at one end of the room. The Casey has a full basement. Its exterior walls are of frame construction with siding. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Dimensions of The Casey are 26 feet by 27 feet with a 4-foot front projection. The house has an area of 1,026 square feet and a volume of 20,642 cubic feet.
