It is usually best to avoid making an overcall in a suit in which you cannot stand a lead from your partner if your left hand opponent plays the hand. Miss Brash is right in these again overcalling on as fine a collection of trumps as you would ever want to see. She might have been murdered but, as the cards lie, she can actually make two. He told me later that he didn't think he was quite strong enough to jump to three hearts whereas a two heart bid wouldn't tell his partner he had anything in high cards. So to show some strength including a club stopper he bid two no trump. It must be admitted that the old boy is a bit of a no-trump hound—probably a hold-over from his auction bridge days.

With some reason Mr. Abel wanted to know why Miss Brash hadn't passed the opening diamond bid, in which case he would have made his normal lead of a spade against the three no trump contract. And that would have set it. Mr. Abel was right. One of the sound reasons for overcalling is to offer partner a safe and constructive opening lead in case the enemy buys the contract.

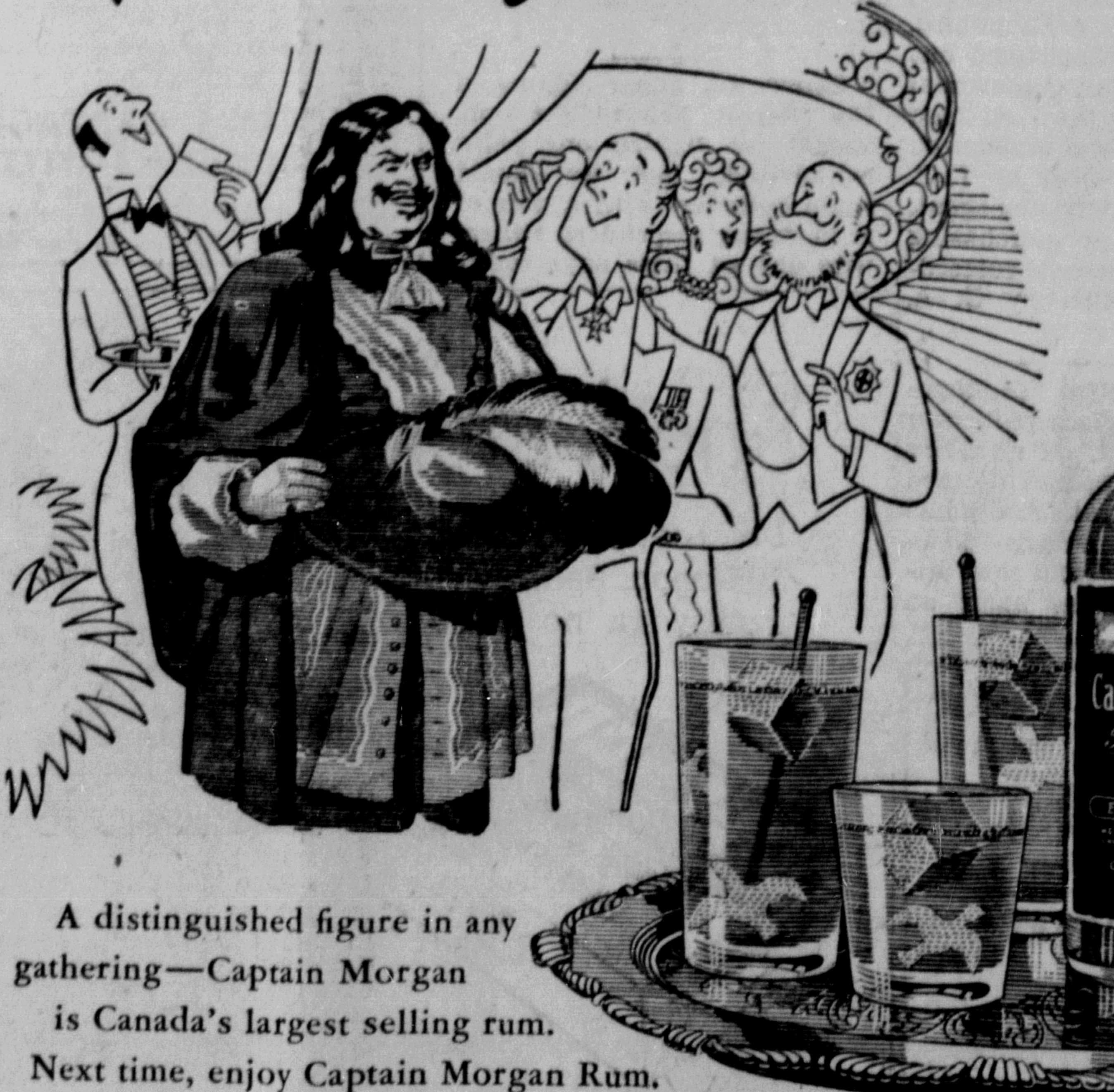
