home.

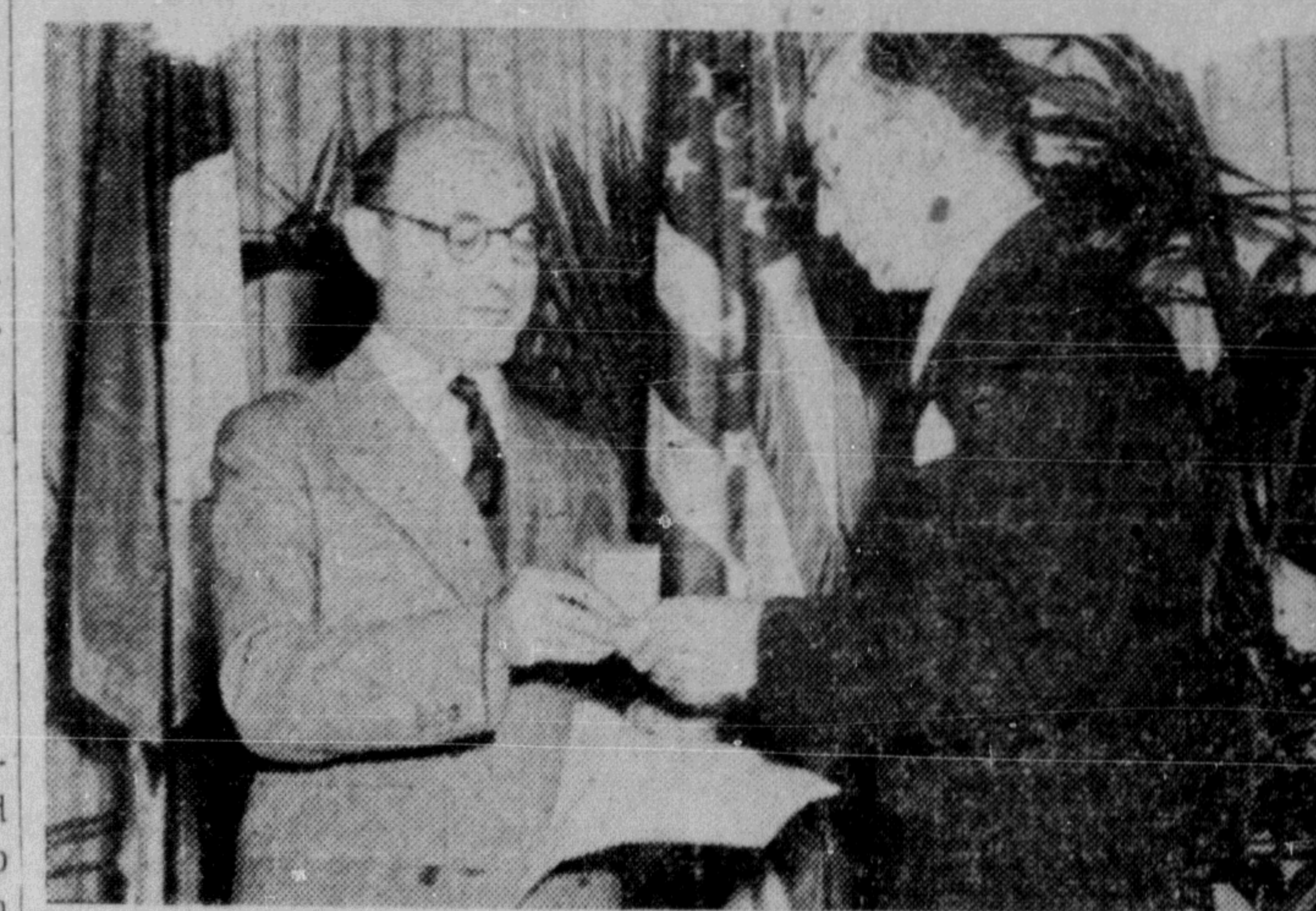
