WHOOPING COUGH ONLY DISEASE

Activities of Recent Months Reviewed in Report of Public Health Unit

Whooping cough has been the only prevalent communicable disease during months in the district, according to a report by Dr. R. M. Lane, director of the Prince Rupert Health Unit.

The report says that plans have been proceeding in the endeavour to clear up the rat problem in Prince Rupert. A quantity of the substance which is now considered the most effective rat killer was purchased by the city engineer's department and was used at the city dump and on individual premises where required.

Consideration is also being given by health authorities to the question of garbage collection and disposal.

Immunization activities of the unit have been extended to U.S. and school examinations have recently been completed there and at Prince Rupert.

Personnel activities of late have included a visit to Alice Arm by Medical Health Officer who examined the students and inspected the school and by the sanitarian, who inspected industrial camps.

Miss D. Brown has begun a monthly well child clinic in Hazelton. Such clinics are being held monthly at Terrace and twice a month in Prince Rupert.

SEE NO NEED FOR BRINGING IN PLANNERS

Prince Rupert, which was conceived on the drawing board of a firm of town planning engineers, is one of the few cities in Canada that has no need of basic town planning and its zoning bylaw is subject only to any modifications or revisions that progress may demand, the city council members believe.

The aldermen got into a discussion on town planning last night when they received a letter from a Vancouver firm of municipal planners which asked to be considered should the city embark on any long-term development program.

"This city was planned before it was built," Mayor Arnold told the aldermen. "It is one of the few cities in Canada that had the benefit of town planning right from the start."

Alderman Brooksbank rose in defence of the city's zoning bylaw, which, he said, might be inadequate but was, nevertheless, subject to modification if the development of the city should so require.

"I see no need for bringing in town planning engineers," he said.

Alderman George Rudderham, who last night was appointed chairman of the zoning committee, said that "the whole zoning scheme is going to come up for review in the near future. I think we should let the people know of this so that if they have any ideas or plans about zoning they can bring them before the committee."

Included with Alderman Rudderham on the zoning committee are Aldermen Brooksbank and Casey and City Engineer Howe.
