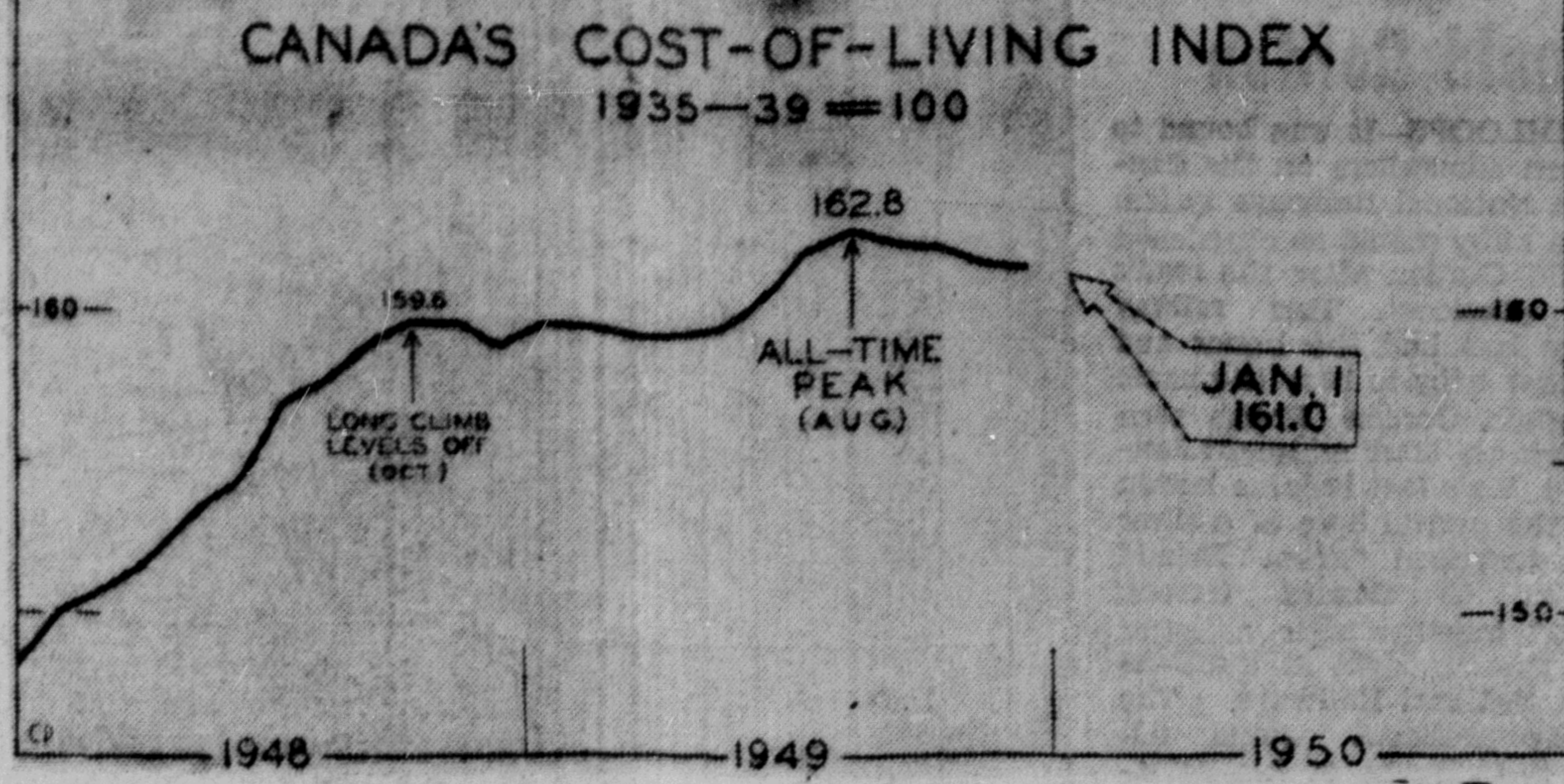


Waterfront - - Whiffs

Seventeen Thousand Tons of Herring—Port Simpson Hunting Accident

Herring seining in Edye Pass, Surf Inlet and Ogden Channel was suspended last Thursday night due to heavy winds and the 50 vessels engaged in the operations, before coming into port for the week-end, dumped their loads in packers which proceeded to Namu, Butedale, Steveston, Vancouver and other southern points due to power shortage and relief in this respect can only depend on the weather. Total catch last week was 17,315 tons, the majority caught in Edye Pass (15,155 tons) and Ogden Channel (1,440 tons). At Surf Inlet the catch amounted to 720 tons. The areas are divided into the central sub-division and the northern sub-division. From the northern sub-division at Edye Pass and Ogden Channel, the catch since the season started is 20,175 tons, 9,625 tons short of the 30,000 ton quota for that sector. In the other sub-division, which includes Surf Inlet, catch to date has totalled 23,151 tons of the quota of 40,000 tons. It is expected the northern sub-

division quota will have been cleaned up within the next two or three days whereupon the fleet will move to the central area to clean up fish there if they are still running.
