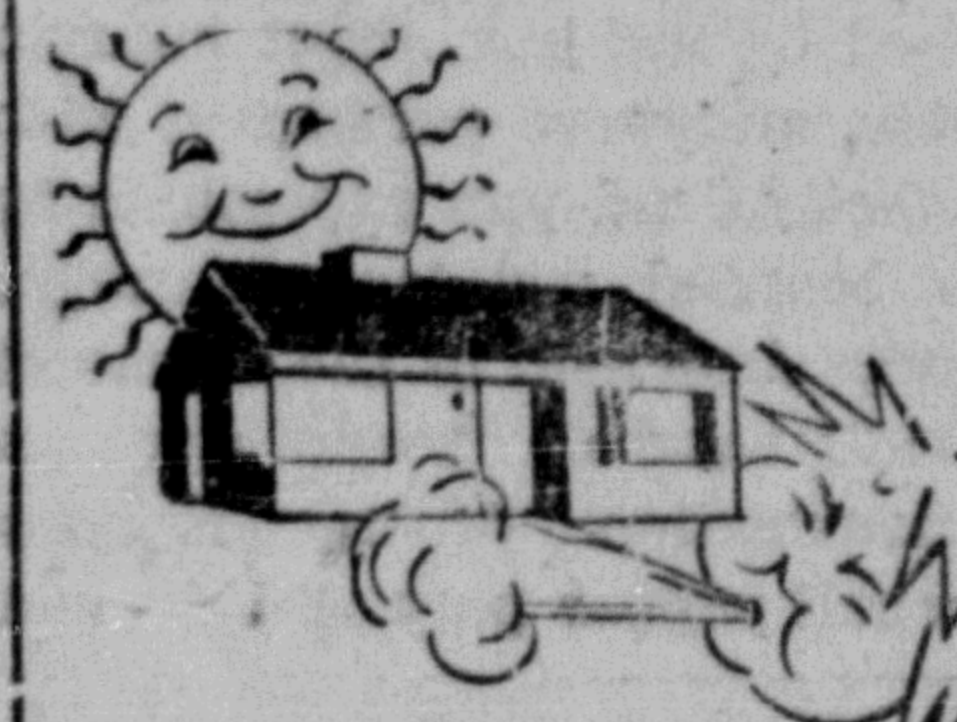

MacMillan Export Company Limited last year brought to British Columbia more than \$64,000,000 in new money. From sales in the United States it brought in nearly \$17,000,000 in United States funds which it sold to the Canadian Foreign Exchange Control Board.
