SHIPS and WATERFRONT

Ice Delays Norah in North—Union Night at Rupert

Unexpected icy conditions in the Lynn Canal last week forced the Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Norah, Capt. Graham Hughes, to return to Juneau and wait until favorable conditions would permit proceeding of the northbound vessel to its destination—Skagway. Enroute to Vancouver Saturday night, the vessel arrived in Prince Rupert almost three hours late—and short of fuel. Docking at the Imperial Oil dock at 7 p.m., it received oil while Vancouver bound passengers patiently waited. It wasn't until approximately 9:30 that the vessel tied up at the C.P.R. dock. Mechanical trouble in pumping oil into the engine room lengthened its stay at the oil pier to two and one-half hours. Leaving for Vancouver at about 10:30, total time lost was over four hours.

Again it was Union Steamship night at the Canadian National dock here Sunday. In good time, the steamer Coquitlam, Capt. John Boden, arrived from Vancouver and waypoints, sailing at 11 p.m. for Alice Arm, Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow morning to sail south at 1:30 p.m. From Masset Inlet points, the steamer Chilcotin, Capt. Harry McLean, arrived at 5:45 p.m., sailing at 9 p.m. in continuation of her voyage to Vancouver.

At conclusion of the present voyage, Chief Engineer Fred Smith will go ashore from the steamer Coquitlam for his annual vacation. He will be relieved by R. A. Dick, another of the well known chief engineers of the company.

Death Takes Jack Plint

Death took place last night at the Prince Rupert General Hospital, where he had been a patient for only a few days, of John Henry (Jack) Plint, for 30 years a well-known and highly respected citizen of Prince Rupert. He was 72 years of age and was born in England, August 26, 1877.

Mr. Plint was a veteran of World War I and served in the Royal (Canadian) Naval Volunteer Reserve in the rating of Engine Room Artificer. He was for 22 years in the employ of the Department of Transport and at the time of his retirement three years ago was chief engineer of the lighthouse tender Birnie.

Deceased leaves to mourn his passing, his widow, Mrs. Annie Plint, 1710 2nd Ave. West and a daughter, Mrs. Harvey Gillis of Vancouver.

Mr. Plint was a member of the Canadian Legion and the Masonic Order.

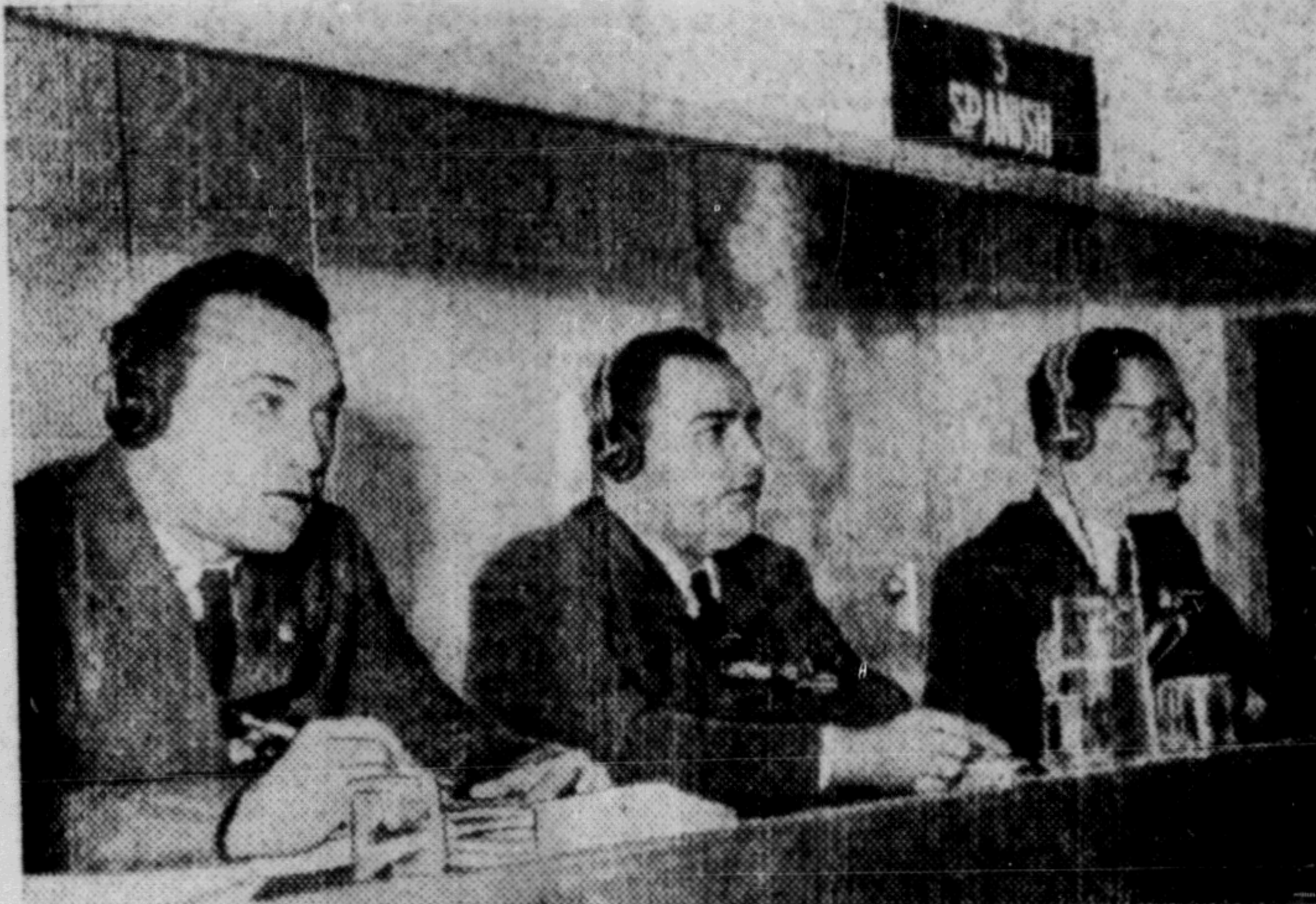
Burial will take place in the Soldiers' Plot Fairview Cemetery on Thursday.
