

Surges Are Explained

A complaint was included in the report of the board of works committee, lead at Monday night's meeting of the city council, that water surges in the mains were being caused by cutting in the Northern B.C. Power Company's lines and cutting them off. The complaint suggested that better co-operation between power company and city staffs might reduce the surges and asked that the city contact the company with that end in view. In presenting the report, Ald. George Casey said he felt the surges were placing great strain on the city's distribution system and possibly causing some of the blow-outs.

Ald. T. B. Black, who is also general manager of the power company, said the surges had been occurring during the first part of August while the company was replacing poles and lines in the east end. The line had been in service for the past 25 or 30 years and the company wanted to replace it before it became useless. Periodically between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., he said, it was necessary to kill the line to permit men to work on it.
