**Jets Receive Good Lesson**

California Mohawks Win Basketball Game by 76 to 53 Score

The California College All-Star Mohawks basketball team gave another sparkling demonstration of the hoop game on Thursday night, disposing of the Rupert Jets by a 76 to 53 score. Once again it was first-class ball and the Mohawks looked even better than in their first two games. They are an all-star team picked from each college in the San Francisco Bay area, for the trip and, as they had no opportunity to play as a unit until getting on the road, their play improves greatly as the trip progresses.

Frank Kizara, guard from the University of San Francisco, was easily the star of the game, shooting 29 points, and demonstrating dribble and defuse techniques that had the crowd giving him a big hand every time he went down the floor. Kramm was again effective under the hoop, snagging rebound after rebound from his lofty 6'5 1/2", to score 21 points.

For Prince Rupert, Don Scherk looked good with 13 points and the team played well as a unit all evening. Guards Joe Davis and Sonny Beynon were missing from the line-up and the defence suffered as a result.

Financially the series was not a success. The lateness of the season, and small crowds resulted in a small loss to the Basketball Association. However, it was the best straight basketball ever offered here. Coach Angus Macphee declared it the best lesson it has received for the same expenditure.
