### Bridal Costumes of 3 Decades, Latest Styles Shown at Capitol

Bridal costumes of three decades and the latest in glamorous fashions were revealed charmingly on the stage of the Capitol Theatre Tuesday evening with the annual fall fashion show of Annette's Ladies' Wear in conjunction with the Capitol Theatre management which played to a packed house during an intermission in the regular theatre program.

The bridal display, featuring costumes worn by brides of 1908, 1928 and 1948 received a rousing ovation which climaxed the modelling of current creations by a dozen charming mannequins. Fashions for all moods and occasions were presented with a musical background that complemented the lyric of the gowns themselves.

The display will be repeated on the Capitol stage tonight.

Appreciation of the audience was demonstrated continually, but it reached its peak when the triple bridal procession, featuring Miss Margaret Brain "Miss P.N.E." as the bride of 1948 in a breathtaking creation, crossed the stage leisurely.

Her four attendants, all dressed in a new shade of mauve pink, looked particularly sweet with their blue mauve muffs and net crowns. They were Diane Kennedy, Leona Blain, Lois Thompson and Mary Adcock. Annette Windle and Georgina were dainty bridesmaids in white.

The charming bride in the costume of 1928 was Stella Kurlock, also a Miss P.N.E. contestant. Her gown featured an "up in the front, down in the back" effect current two decades ago and was of taffeta and lace. Her bridesmaids, Benita Windle and Pat Stewart, wore short dresses, short waisted with flaired skirts.

Leading the bridal procession was Miss Edith Jordan, brunette runner-up in the local Miss P.N.E. contest, whose costume was of the 1908 decor, which revealed that bridal styles have fulfilled a cycle in 40 years. In the manner of the day, bridesmaids Alice Christensen and Joyce Vanetta followed the bride and assisted with her train. Their period costumes revealed black shoes and stockings.

The parade of current fashions which preceded the bridal processions was announced by Walter Smith from a microphone backstage, while the mannequins displayed the lovely creations in slow progress across the footlights. Appropriate musical effects were created by Andy McNaughton at the piano.

Shoes, which enhanced the costumes, were supplied by Brownwoods Shoe Store. Bill Scuby's fur store provided the luxurious furs.

Directing the parade was Mrs. Annette Mansell, proprietor of Annette's Ladies' Wear, sponsor of the display.
