**IRRIGATION PIPELINE** — Rapidly nearing completion is this wood stave pipeline, built as a syphon across the Pinepound Coulee near the Alberta town of Spring Coulee for the main canal of the huge St. Mary-Milk rivers irrigation projects. A second syphon will be built later. With an inside diameter of 13 feet, it will carry 1,600 cubic feet of water per second across the coulee. Through its 960-foot length, the pipeline drops 60 feet and then rises that height again. (CP Photo)

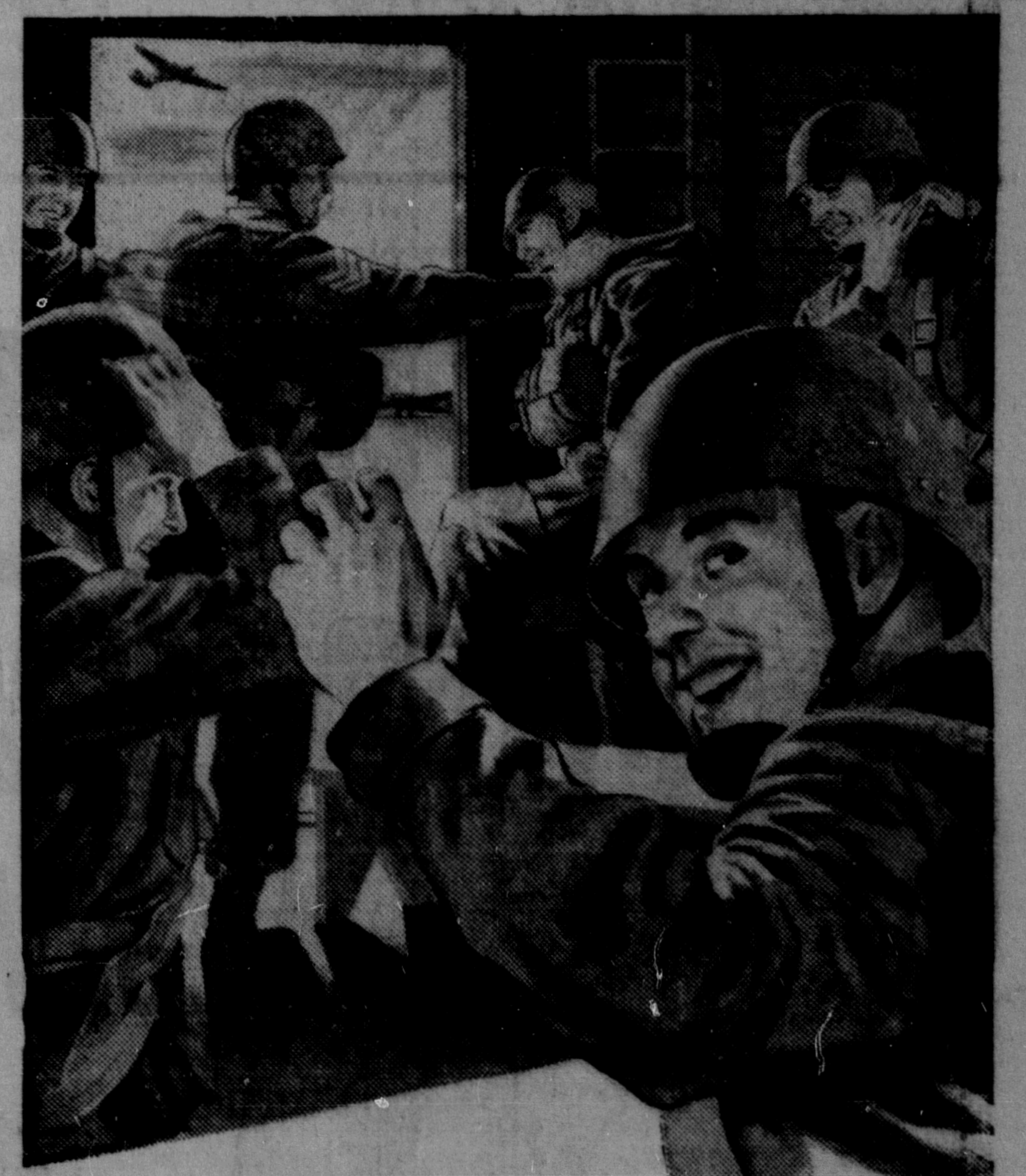
