Warfare Breaks Out Anew Between Jews and Arabs

TEL AVIV (P) - Jews and Egyptians hammered each other in Southern Palestine today with air and land attacks which threatened to shatter the truce in the Holy Land. Heavy casualties are reported in the new violence which is said to be the gravest in three months.

Whether or not the new outbreak constitutes a mere fracture of the truce or a resumption of full scale war will ne known within twelve hours.

Official sources in Cairo said that Egypt had sent an urgent note to the United Nations Security Council reporting that the Jews were violating the Palestine truce. Informants said that Jewish planes had raided Alarish airport on the Egyptian-Palestine frontier.

United Nations officials at Haifa announced later today that Israel had rejected a ceasefire order issued to Israeli to end fighting with Egyptian forces at Negev in the southern desert of Palestine.
