C.N.R.A. DOWNS GORDON AND ANDERSON

C.N.R.A. went into a tie with General Motors for second place in the city football league last night when they defeated the league-trailing Gordon and Anderson team by a one-sided score of 19-2 which set G. and A. deeper into the morass of defeat.

The unfortunate furniture men, who have played more than any other team in the league through some quaint vagary of the schedule, now have a record of four defeats and no victories.

Sweet peas and petunias bloom in a London site today because of a woman novelist's faith in a fleet filly. The novelist, Miss Noel Streetfield, collected £60 (\$240) when Sheila's Cottage, defying 50-1 odds, won the 1948 Grand National at Aintree. Miss Streetfield invested the proceeds in beautifying the bombed site, near her Elizabeth Street apartment in Belgravia. For three weeks, she gave every spare moment to clearing debris from the site. Amused and admiring neighbors watched as she made space for a garden in the shattered cellars of what was once a hotel. Soil was "imported" from Surrey at £5 a load. Water was carried from a nearby house. Late in May the first results appeared—sweet peas, petunias and nasturtiums. Later snapdragons, stocks and chrysanthemums will be seen. Miss Streetfield argues that bombed sites are "depressing." People with a feeling for gardening, she says, should do something about it.

The Test Cricket matches between England and Australia have the experts guessing. England hasn't won the Ashes since 1926 and the popular odds are 2-1 that she won't do it this time. In fact Australia has already won the first match of the five. It was at Nottingham. The next will be at Lords.
