NEW LIGHTHOUSE NOW COMPLETED

Except for the installation of the light itself, construction has been completed of the new lighthouse at Egg Island in Queen Charlotte Sound to replace the one which a year ago was swept away by gale and tidal wave.

A. B. Carswell of Ottawa, director of lighthouse construction for the Department of Transport, arrived in the city on the Catala Sunday evening after having made a final inspection of the new lighthouse. He is accompanied by Mrs. Carswell. In about a week they will leave by motor on their return to Ottawa, accompanied by L. E. Slaght, also of Ottawa, who has been superintending the construction of the new light at Egg Island. Lighthouse Keeper Dupuis will be leaving shortly for Egg Island to take charge there replacing Bruce Rogers who is returning to Vancouver after having been there for a time.

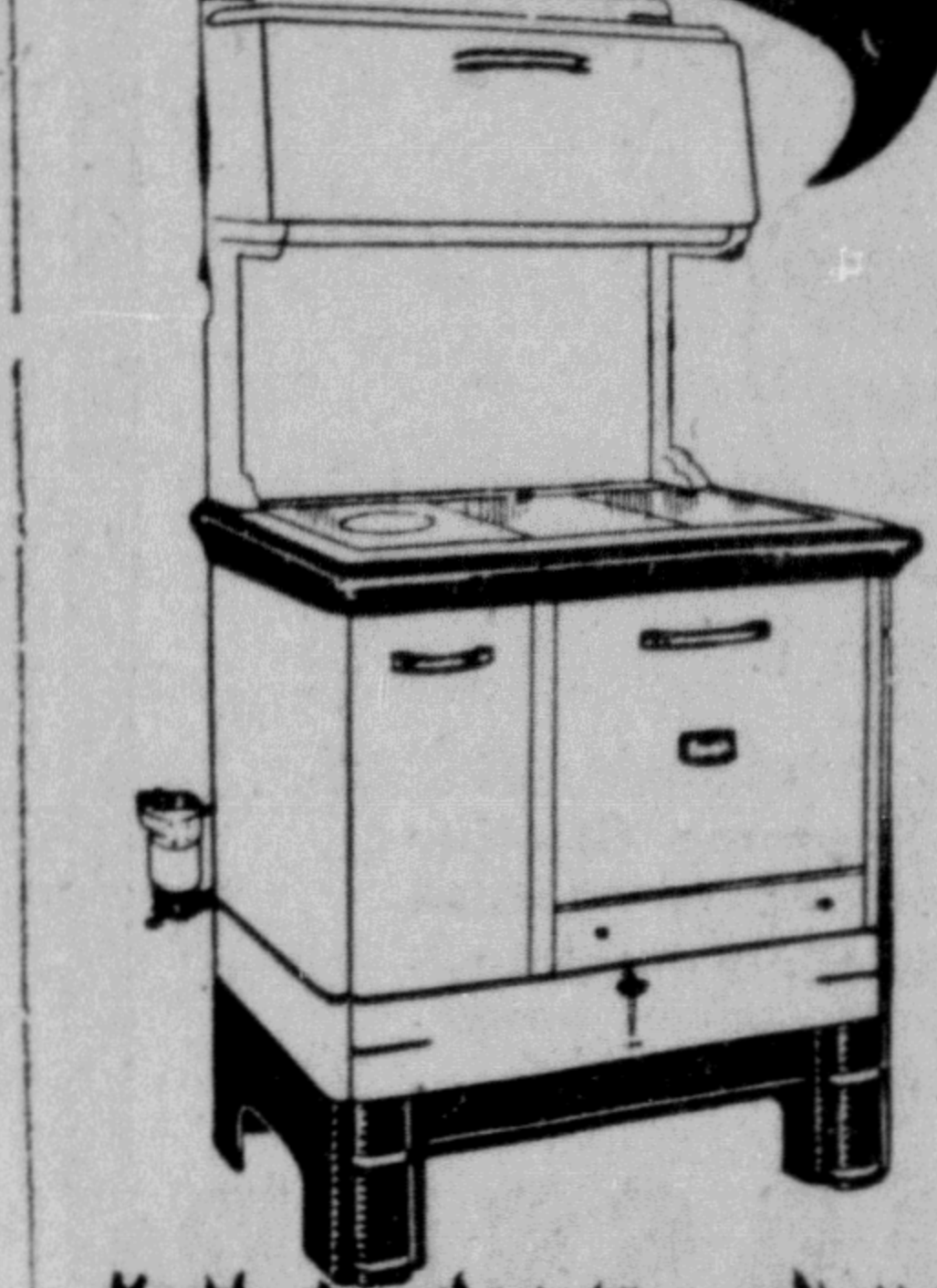
