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New Rule For Milk Serving

To insure the sanitary serving of milk in public eating places, a civic bylaw, providing that milk used as a beverage in any restaurant shall be served in the original bottle and opened in the presence and sight of the patron for whom it is intended, is now in force. Restaurants are, accordingly, changing to paper containers in many cases and leaving it to the customers themselves to do the pouring. Health authorities are following up the enforcement of the bylaw which was finally passed by the city council January 9. Restaurants are falling in line. (68)
