WOLF RAIDS IN EUROPE

Severely Cold Weather Forces
Canine Marauders Down
From Italian and
Norwegian Mountains

LONDON, —Frigid weather, which has been prevailing for the past couple of days in the British Isles and western Europe, will continue and still lower temperatures are in prospect, weather forecasters said today.

Cold and snow have driven marauding packs of wolves down from the Silla Mountains in southern Italy.

In Norway packs of wolves have raided herds of cattle, causing such losses that military planes have been sent out to shoot them down.

Civil Cases Are Adjourned

Hearing of three civil claims against F. A. Cobbaert, logging operator, scheduled for Thursday in County Court, were adjourned for one week because of failure of two of the plaintiffs to appear. Peter and James Byrne, who are suing Cobbaert separately, the former for \$555 boat hire and the latter for \$160 wages, were out of the city at the time set for the hearing by Judge W. O. Fulton. The third suit against Cobbaert, entered by Crawford Moore for supplies allegedly sent to Cobbaert's logging camp, also was held over. The law firm of Brown and Harvey is acting for the plaintiffs and MacLeod and Ray for the defendants.

One Body Sighted Lashed To Derelict's Wheelhouse

BODY IS HOGAN'S
VICTORIA (CP)—The body of Lewis Hogan of Vancouver was found lashed to the pilot house of the cannery tender Louisa Todd, beached in Whale Channel, south of Prince Rupert. Identification of the body as being that of Hogan, manager of Klemtu cannery, was officially announced by R. W. Sinclair, production manager of J. H. Todd & Sons Ltd.

Three Men Conceded to Have Perished— Rescue Vessels Trying to Get Alongside

It became certain today that Lewis W. Hogan, manager of J. H. Todd & Sons salmon cannery at Klemtu; Charles Hoy, skipper of the cannery service boat Louisa Todd, and the engineer "Doug," last name so far unascertained, perished on Tuesday of this week in the loss of the Louisa Todd in Wright Sound.

At noon Hogan's body was removed from the wreck in Whale Channel.

In spite of extremely rough sea and a snowstorm, the provincial police boat P.M.L. 15 was able this morning to get near enough alongside the wreck of the Louisa Todd to sight the

Russia Is "Disturbing"

However, President Truman Still Hopes Go Will Be Made of United Nations

WASHINGTON, D.C. —President Truman said yesterday that Russia's refusal to carry out United Nations decisions had raised a "disturbing" new problem but, despite the failure of the Soviet Union and its satellites to co-operate, the United Nations is making headway. Mr. Truman told United States Congress that "strengthening of the United Nations continues to be the cornerstone of foreign policy of the United States."

THREE BISHOPS ARE EXECUTED

Vatican Hears of Catholic Clerics Being Put to Death

VATICAN CITY —Vatican sources said today that two Roman Catholic bishops had been executed in Albania and a third had been sentenced to twenty years in prison. The executed bishops were identified as Most Rev. Francis Cjini and Most Rev. George Volaj. All were Albanians.

FINE PELTS TO SWITZERLAND

WINNIPEG —All that distinguished three buriaps bags from other routine cargo being loaded aboard a Trans-Canada Air Lines eastbound plane last night were the stencilled words: "Product of Canada." Inside them, though, was \$50,000 worth of choice fur, the finest mink and fox pelts ever raised in Canada.

Bound for Basle, Switzerland, the bales contained Canada's exhibit to the classic international fur and leather fair, to open March 16 and continuing for two weeks.

Assembled at Winnipeg this past week, the show consignment includes every type of fox and natural and mutation mink bred in the Dominion. There are 300 mink pelts alone, nearly all from the west, and an assortment of finished articles such as jackets and neckpieces. They will be seen by buyers from all over the world.

Communists Taking Over

CzechoSlovakian Premier Would Purge His Administration of 'Reactionaries'

PRAGUE (CP)—The Communist Premier of CzechoSlovakia, Klement Gottwald, speaking to thousands at a public rally, today demanded a "new government from top to bottom" in this buffer state between Russia and the West. His followers, massed in the old town square, cheered him, shouting: "We are prepared" and "Long live the government of Premier Gottwald without reactionaries."

Lost Both Arms And Legs, Dies

VANCOUVER —John McNabb, aged 46, who suffered the loss of both arms and legs when struck by a shunting Canadian Pacific Railway train, died in hospital yesterday four hours after he had been found beneath a freight car.

RUSSIA LOOKS FOR BIG CROP

MOSCOW, —Mild weather and ample rainfall give promise of bumper crops throughout Russia this spring, newspaper Socialist Agriculture said yesterday. The paper said that the weather had been warmer this winter than in many years.
