



Norman Smith, assistant managing director of a company manufacturing cranes and excavating equipment said there was a danger that Canadian buyers might switch to American supplies once the dollar balance was righted.

Crescent Granted Orange Sale Brings \$300

It looks as if Crescent Shows will visit Prince Rupert after all. A few weeks ago the Civic Centre and the Shrine Club of Prince Rupert commenced a verbal battle in City Council chambers on the topic "Should the Shrine Club Dates be Granted?" Previous to this meeting, the Shrine Club was given permission to hold a carnival from June 30 to July 8. But when they informed council that it was not possible to stage a show on those days and requested a change in dates to July 20 to 29, the Civic Centre stepped in.

The Civic Centre argued that the Shrine's dates were too close to the Centre's carnival dates of August 19 to 26. "We feel we need adequate protection previous to our dates," they said.

Both the Shrine Club and Civic Centre argued that they were worthy organizations. Aldermen sympathized with both organizations but leaned over to the Civic Centre's side as it was a community enterprise and worked for the city throughout the year. "Protection should be given to it," they said.

Then, a wire dated April 20 made its way to the City Clerk H. D. Thain from Henry Meyerhoff of Crescent Shows. Very blunt and straightforward, it said, in part:

"... these two differently operated fairs will not conflict; or does the Civic Centre want to hog it all? IMPOSSIBLE to change Crescent Shows dates, and if you do not give Crescent permission, why, we will have to pass up Prince Rupert."

Well, as nothing is impossible these days, Mr. Meyerhoff will bring his midway to the city on the previously designated dates—June 30 to July 8.

C. A. Berner, secretary of the Shrine Club informed council Monday of this move in a letter read by the city clerk.

Alderman H. F. Glassey said "But Port Day falls on July 1."

Apparently the Mayor and other Aldermen thought another argument would be just too much and granted the dates.
