Council, Chamber Talk Road Repair
 Roads came in for discussion at the regular meeting of Prince Rupert City Council last night when a committee from the Chamber of Commerce asked what was being done or what could be done in the way of repairs along the route from the city limits along Shawatlans Road to Frederick Street, along Frederick to 11th Avenue, on 11th to McBride, along McBride to Second Avenue.
 President L. M. Felsenthal of the chamber said the chamber wants to know if a workable solution to the black topping of that route could be arrived at. He said he had been advised City Engineer Don Stewart and Provincial Engineer Halford W. Stephens had been conferring on the matter. He suggested if Mr. Stewart was unable to handle the work, he might find co-operation from the Department of Public Works.
 His Worship Mayor Rudderham said the Provincial Government had agreed two years ago to take over the route under discussion and that Mr. Stewart had turned in estimates of the cost to Mr. Stephens.
 Ald. George Casey said the government had removed itself from responsibility for the route because some one professing to speak for the city favored the Prince Rupert boulevard route. He added that any one speaking to the government for Prince Rupert was exceeding his authority and the government was taking advantage of the excuse to leave the highway out of their estimates. He said it should be pointed out to the government that at no time has the boulevard been considered by the council as the arterial highway into the city.
 J. D. McRae, who was present at the meeting told the council that at no time had he spoken for the City Council on roads. The estimates were already made up when they arrived at Victoria.
 Ald. T. B. Black said the council had passed a resolution favoring the route as outlined above. The situation of little money for roads in municipalities was general throughout the province. He hoped some arrangement could be made to have 11th Avenue done. Efforts against the City Council were not helping any, he declared.
 Mr. Felsenthal then said the policy of the Chamber of Commerce was to make suggestions rather than criticize and that he had given suggestions on different matters to members of both Provincial and Dominion Houses and the suggestions had been regarded as having been given in a helpful way. He wanted the council to feel the same about suggestions the chamber was putting forward. Ald. T. B. Black suggested that people who went around making unauthorized suggestions often brought carefully laid plans to nothing.
 Ald. Frizzell reported that when he met with the Minister of Public Works he had been told there would be little money spent on roads in municipalities this year. He said he had told what the city had done and that Victoria was willing to co-operate. Nothing had been put in the estimates for roads in Prince Rupert. He then went on regarding the Chamber of Commerce's suggestions. He said the April meeting was reported as having discussed a proposed new route for the highway through a section suggested for a housing development but the council had not been informed of the Chamber's suggestion for a different route. He quoted a clipping from the Daily News of that time. "That feeling gets to Victoria and it hurts," he added. He felt the chamber was remiss in not informing the council of such discussions.
 When the point was brought to his mind, Mr. Felsenthal recalled a discussion about a rumor to the effect of a change in route but said there had been no decision made.
 The Chamber of Commerce delegation was told everything possible would be done to have the roads mentioned repaired.

B.C. Pulp, Paper Demand Growing
 VANCOUVER—British Columbia pulp and paper may soon be in demand in the world's sterling areas again as a spokesman for the industry said today. R. M. Fowler of Montreal, president of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, said in an interview that Sterling areas can not produce enough paper to satisfy the growing needs. They are now enquiring into the Canadian market. British, Australia, South Africa and South America have all shown renewed interest in Canadian pulp. Exports, cut by dollar difficulties, can be expected to resume. Europe with her growing economic stability, is using more and more pulp and paper, Fowler said. The United States demand for the Canadian product is up eight per cent this year over 1949's record shipment.
