## NEW INTERIOR INDUSTRY SEEN

FRANCOIS LAKE- Promis of a new industry in this area is contained in a report received here by Mrs. A. H. Neave that a Calgary firm plans to exploit Faught, perlite, a type of volcanic lava Shrubsall and Frances found locally, as a building left Sunday night on material in conjunction with

Mrs. Neave was given the information from E. H. Gurton, European Commissioner of Colonization for Canadian National Railways who learned of it in a British publication.

The Calgary firm plans tow build a \$100,000 plant-first of its kind in Canada. It is be. lieved likely that recently-discovered perlite deposits a miles east of Francois Landing may be used in process.

Perlite is a gray, glassy substance. The Francois Lake deposit is said to be a large one.


