**Customs Revenue Hits 5-Year Peak**

Customs and excise revenues at the port of Prince Rupert reached the highest peak in 1948 of any year since 1944, totalling \$497,758. The figure was \$95,000 greater than in 1947. Only greater year in the last five was 1944 when revenues totalled \$557,486.
