Today in Sports

SHORT SPORT

Archery—most ancient, most difficult and most English sport—is today enjoying a post-war craze, particularly among women. More than 50 societies in Britain, whose membership lapsed in wartime are building them up again. Sports outfitters report a boom in equipment which includes bow, waistquiver with half a dozen arrows, armguards and leather shooting tab.

Women like toxiphily—archery's official name—because it develops graceful postures and lithe figures. Experts say no sport achieves a quicker effect on physique, powers of judgment and concentration. But it is more strenuous than one might think. An average woman's bow needs a pull of 25 pounds. In a shooting "round" four dozen arrows are launched at a target from 60 yards, and another two dozen from 50 yards. Three arrows are shot in succession from alternate ends of the range, so that the archer walks three and a half miles.

There are no professional archers in England. Archers consider themselves comrades and teach others at their clubs. The King took up archery two years ago. He invited two members of the 270-year old Royal Company of Archers to Balmoral Castle to teach him. The Royal Company presented him with bows and arrows which were 28 inches long and carried his racing colors of red and blue in their flight feathers. Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret also have bows and arrows.

Archers' biggest worry today is the cost of bows and arrows. Purchase tax is still charged on selling prices at 100 per cent. Some arrows cost \$20 a dozen. A good yew bow costs 15—three times the pre-war price. Steel bows, which modern archers find less susceptible to weather changes, can be had for about three guineas (\$12.50). Bows and arrows figure in the British export drive. At Oldbury, outside Birmingham, thousands of bows and arrows are being made from high tensile tubing used in Spitfire fighters and Lancaster bombers during the war. After 602 years the Woodmen of Arden, whose club is possibly the most exclusive in the world of archery, sneer at the metal bow and pin their faith to the yew bow of Crey. Mrs. Petronella Burr won the English archery women's championship and the world women's championship at Stockholm last year with a steel bow. Some London bowmen belong to the Royal Toxophilites, who formed their society in 1780. It is said that the gallantry of the 18th century still prevails there. Men still
