## NATIONAL EMERGENCY DECLARED IN STRIKE

### U. S. Flying Supplies To Berlin TRYING TO BREAK BLOCKADE

#### VESSEL FINED

Apura Assessed Under  
Customs and Immigration  
Regulations

Lines totalling \$480 were levied  
against a Vancouver halibut boat  
oper here for failing to re-  
turn to customs and immigration  
authorities after returning to  
Prince Rupert from a foreign  
port.

Solway, skipper of the  
butter Zepora, was fined  
\$10 for failing to report  
immediately the boat's  
arrival from Kodiak, Alaska. The  
Zepora brought 56,000 pounds of  
halibut here Wednesday from  
Kodiak.

Solway was said to have waited  
several hours before reporting the  
arrival of the vessel. Regula-  
tions require that ships enter-  
ing Canadian ports from foreign  
ports must declare their entry  
immediately on arrival.

#### DIRECT DEMAND MAY BE MADE UPON KREMLIN BY WESTERN POWERS

WASHINGTON, D. C. (CP)—The United States  
rushed a fleet of huge  
cargo planes to Germany  
today to help break the  
Russian blockade of  
ground transport to western  
Berlin as food supplies dwindled  
for two million Berliners. Dip-  
lomats predicted that the west-  
ern powers shortly would make  
a direct demand on the Kremlin  
to lift the traffic noose in their  
sectors. This action gave an-  
other indication of determina-  
tion of western powers to stand  
fast and resist the Russian ef-  
forts to blockade rail, canal and  
highway traffic into Berlin.

A British Foreign Office spokes-  
man said that the western pow-  
ers were considering direct "ap-  
proach" to Moscow in an effort  
to obtain an order from Joseph  
Stalin to reverse Soviet policies.  
It was reported late today that  
British supplies were getting into  
Berlin by barges.

#### CURRENCY RIOT

Seven Persons Injured by  
Trampling Crowd in Berlin

BERLIN, (CP)—Police said that  
seven persons were injured when  
trampled in a crowd seeking ex-  
change on old currency for new  
at Russian military headquar-  
ters. The crush became so seri-  
ous that firemen with hoses  
dispersed the crowd.

#### Italy Signs

First of Nations to Formally  
Agree for Aid Under  
Marshall Plan

WASHINGTON, D. C. (CP)—Italy  
was expected today to become  
the first of the 16 Marshall plan  
countries to sign a long-range  
aid agreement with the United  
States.

Fifteen other participants are  
due to sign later agreements  
which commit each to programs  
of help and mutual aid as part  
of the over-all European recov-  
ery programs.

#### KING, QUEEN COMING

OTTAWA — Prime Minister  
King told Parliament today  
that he believed the time was  
coming when Canada would  
be the leading nation in the  
British Commonwealth and  
the King and Queen would  
reside at least part of the time  
in Ottawa. Mr. King was  
speaking in connection with a  
bill to provide funds for de-  
velopment of Ottawa as a na-  
tional capital.

#### SWALLOWED BY REDS

PRAGUE—The Social Demo-  
cratic party of Czech Slovakia  
was formally swallowed up by  
the Communist party yester-  
day. It consisted of 25,000  
members, making the total  
strength of the Communist  
party now 1,750,000.

### WAR DEAD ARE HONORED AGAIN

Annual Decoration Day  
Ceremony of I.O.D.E.

The annual Decoration Day  
ceremony, which is carried out  
each year by the Imperial Order,  
Daughters of the Empire, took  
place on Sunday afternoon,  
those attending mustering out-  
side the Canadian Legion Hall  
from which point the parade  
under Parade Marshal J. S. Wil-  
son "fell in" and marched to  
the Cenotaph in the Court House  
grounds.

The parade was led by the  
Prince Rupert Shrine Club Band  
with bandmaster Peter Lien in  
charge. Following the band were  
representatives of the local  
Chapters of the Imperial Order,  
Daughters of the Empire, with  
their standard bearers, then  
members of the Canadian Leg-  
ion (members of World War I  
predominating), and their stan-  
dard bearers, and members of  
the Women's Auxiliary of the  
Canadian Legion with their  
standard bearers.

At the Cenotaph wreaths were  
laid by Mrs. James Stewart, sec-  
ond vice-regent of the Municipal  
Chapter, Ralph P. Smith, presi-  
dent of the local branch of the  
Canadian Legion (British Empire  
Service League), and Mrs. J. S.  
Black, president of the Canadian  
Auxiliary of the Canadian Leg-  
ion. After the laying of the  
wreaths those taking part in the  
parade, as well as many who  
were in attendance at the Cen-  
otaph, proceeded to the Soldiers'  
Plot at Fairview Cemetery in the  
many cars kindly provided for  
the occasion, as well as in a  
chartered bus, while the Navy  
assisted as usual and provided  
transportation for the band.

A brief, but impressive ser-  
vice was held at the cemetery.  
Rev. Basil S. Procter, rector of  
St. Andrew's Cathedral, officiat-  
ing, in the absence of Rev. Chas.  
L. Lomas, chaplain of the local  
branch of the Canadian Legion.  
The service opened with the  
singing of "O Canada," accom-  
panied by the Band, followed by  
a special prayer for the occasion  
which was read by Mrs. S. A.  
Keilback, regent, Queen Mary  
Chapter, I.O.D.E., at the conclu-  
sion of which "The Last Post" was  
sounded by Bugler W. J. Ran-  
ce of the Canadian Legion, the  
flag, which had been flying at  
the mast-head, being lowered  
to half-mast. Two minutes sil-  
ence, in memory of those who  
had fallen then took place, the  
silence being broken by the  
sounding of "The Reveille" by  
Bugler Rance, while the flag was  
once more hoisted to the mast-  
head.

After a brief address by Rev.  
Basil S. Procter, all present  
joined in singing "O God Our  
Help in Ages Past" after which  
representatives of the various  
organizations present proceeded  
with the ceremony of "decorat-  
ing the graves," a flag and a red  
poppy being placed at the head  
of each grave. All arrangements  
for the day's program were in  
the hands of Mrs. J. A. Teng,  
chairman of the cemetery com-  
mittee of the Queen Mary Chap-  
ter, I.O.D.E.

### STRANGLE KILLING

Toronto Foundry Worker  
Is Under Arrest For  
Murdering Woman

TORONTO (CP)—A foundry  
worker, Leonard B. Smith, aged  
25, was charged Sunday with the  
silk-stocking murder of Leila  
Adams, aged 38, of Toronto. The  
woman's nude body was found  
in a garage in east central Tor-  
onto Saturday and police say  
she had been strangled by a  
stocking. Her face was wrapped  
in blood-stained clothing.

### PALESTINE PEACE

New Proposals Made by  
Mediator to Jews and Arabs

RHODES, (CP)—Jews and Arabs  
received from the United Na-  
tions mediator, Count Folke Ber-  
nadotte, today proposals for  
peace in Palestine. The sugges-  
tions, which Bernadotte called  
"basis for further discussion,"  
are not published.

### Japanese Earthquake

THOUSANDS MAY  
HAVE PERISHED—  
CITY OF FUKUI  
HARD HIT

TOKYO (CP)—West  
coast of Honshu Island  
was rocked today by violent  
earthquakes that may  
have killed thousands of  
Japanese. Tokyo news-  
papers estimate the dead at 1000  
from the first reports but it was  
later said the toll would proba-  
bly amount to 5,000.  
The town of Fukui was "twist-  
ed like taffy" homes of the most  
of the population of 85,000 being  
destroyed. Fires sprang up af-  
ter a series of earthquakes which  
began at 4:12 p.m. and des-  
troyed half of the city. They still  
were raging six hours after the  
tremors. A fully-equipped United  
States Army relief train was  
rushed to Fukui which is on the  
coast of the Sea of Japan. Army  
reports said that 60 persons were  
injured at Daishoji, 20 miles  
northeast of Fukui but there are  
no known dead. Five hundred  
homes were destroyed.

Tidal wave warnings were is-  
sued to the Japanese, who re-  
membering the 44,000 who died  
in the 1923 Tokyo and Yoko-  
hama quake, were jittery.  
Japanese news service, Asahi,  
said that 90 per cent of the  
buildings in Fukui had collapsed  
and communications were dis-  
rupted.

### CHICAGO HOLD-UP

Bandits Escape After Killing  
Two Policemen  
Following Robbery

CHICAGO, (CP)—Five machine  
gun bandits who killed two po-  
licemen after a hold-up of an  
alleged gambling spot Saturday  
appear to have eluded the big-  
gest manhunt in the history of  
Cook County. Police believe the  
gunmen slipped through a cor-  
don of 200 officers to jump a  
freight train after having been  
surrounded in a stone quarry.  
About \$1,000, bulk of the hold-  
up money, was found with guns  
and ammunition at a spot where  
the men are believed to have  
forded the Desplaines River in  
an attempt to escape a police  
trap.

### VE DEAD IN DROWNING TRAGEDY

Two Men and Three Boys  
Die In Boat Capsized  
On Kootenay Lake

SIRDAR (CP)—Two men and  
three boys were drowned in  
Kootenay Lake near here Sun-  
day when an outboard motor-  
boat was caught in an under-  
current, whirled around and cap-  
sized.

A sixth boy, Edgar Hornsath,  
aged 12, swam ashore.

The dead, who were on a fish-

ing trip, have been identified as:  
Henry Hornsath, aged 36, Sirdar.

Art Rowsell, 36, Kimberley;  
Gordon, 11, Kimberley;  
John Kollman, 11, Kimberley;  
Buddy Annable, 10, of nearby  
Tyc.

Sirdar is 35 miles east of Nelson  
in the Kootenay district.  
The survivor said that the boat  
began swinging wildly as the  
motor re-started 1000 feet off-  
shore. He said the boat was

### MARSHAL TITO IS CHARGED

YUGOSLAVIA NOT PLAYING BALL  
WITH RUSSIA IT IS CHARGED

PRAGUE (CP)—The Communist Cominform  
charged today that Yugoslav Communists had de-  
parted from the Marx-Lenin line and that their  
leaders, including Marshal Tito, were pursuing a  
hateful policy toward Russia. The Cominform called  
for "either a return to Marxist policy or a change of  
leaders in Yugoslavia."

Thus is marked the first break  
in the ranks of nine eastern na-  
tions which form the Comin-  
form, international Communist  
"information bureau", set up at  
a meeting in Poland last fall.

### Bitter Debate

OTTAWA (CP)—A bitter debate  
on prices exploded in the House  
of Commons Saturday, blocking  
the prorogation drive and bring-  
ing on John Diefenbaker (Pro-  
gressive-Conservative, Lake Cen-  
tre, Saskatchewan), the charge  
that recommendations of the all-  
party prices committee had been  
tailor-made by the government.

As the House rose at 11 p.m.  
Eastern Daylight Time it still  
was a question whether the ses-  
sion could be brought to an end  
by Tuesday or Wednesday.

The recommendations, criticiz-  
ed by Diefenbaker, were con-  
tained in a committee report  
tabled Saturday and included  
one for the removal of the excise  
taxes and import controls which  
had been imposed in last Novem-  
ber's currency conservation pro-  
gram.

### N.B. Voting

Polling Light After Quiet  
Campaign—Results This  
Afternoon

ST. JOHN, N.B.—A total of 125  
candidates filed their nomina-  
tion papers for the provincial  
election in New Brunswick which  
is taking place today. Liberals  
are contesting all of the 52 seats.  
Five Social Credit standard-  
bearers, one in St. John County  
and others in Madawaska  
brought the total to 125. This  
will be the first time the Social  
Credit party has made a bid for  
election, in this province.

Of the Liberal candidates,  
four were members of the last  
House.

The Liberals, under Premier  
John B. McNair, had a head  
start with five candidates nam-  
ed by acclamation in Gloucester  
county.

The remaining 16 ridings, all  
multiple seats with two to four  
members, are being contested  
by 47 Liberals, 40 Progressive-  
Conservatives, 20 N.B.F.P., eight  
Independents and five Social  
Crediters.

With rain and heavy clouds  
prevailing, the vote up to this  
afternoon was light. The cam-  
paign was also mild and quiet  
which also figured as a factor in  
the indicated light vote.

Eligible voters are unofficially  
estimated at 257,000 to elect  
the new 52-seat house  
brought about by partial distri-  
bution.

Polls opened at 8 a.m. Atlan-  
tic Standard Time (5 a.m. Pac-  
ific Daylight Time) and closed  
at 6 p.m. (3 p.m. Pacific Stand-  
ard Time).

### TASS LAYS BLAME

Says Western Powers are  
Responsible for Situation  
in Germany

MOSCOW, (CP)—A Tass dis-  
patch from Berlin today blamed  
the western powers for reduc-  
tions in coal, steel and food sup-  
plies there. It said that this  
"shows once more that the west-  
ern states want by all means  
possible to retain the dismem-  
berment of Germany and ruin  
her economy in the interests of  
imperialistic policy."
