SHORT SPORT

The first bobsleigh race ever recorded took place 50 years ago at St. Moritz, Switzerland, where the bobsleigh had been invented eight years earlier. Time for the mile-and-a-half course was 2:54 compared with the present running time of about 1:40. Bobsleighing was first incorporated into the Olympic games in 1922.

The great Finnish runner, Paava Nurmi, made his American debut 23 years ago by shattering world records. He set a mile time of 4:13 3/5 and ran 5,000 metres in 14:44 3/5. Both records now are held by the Swedish runner, Gunder Haegg, with times of 4:01 and 8m. 12s. respectively.

A sportsman has come up with the bright idea that golfers, on arriving at the ninth hole should play the holes over again—the reverse way. The other half, he says, would be dug and plowed to grow potatoes and "things." He proposes a digging competition among the golfers, starting at the tenth. But don't some of them do that now—starting at the first?

Judge Fraser Harrison of Liverpool says he may have "old-fashioned ideas" but he doesn't believe it's a "matrimonial offence" for a man to play golf. He granted a degree of divorce to Paul Bates on the grounds of desertion by his wife, Emma. Of Mrs. Bates, he said: "She is obviously a very attractive woman and if she, in the absence of her husband, is sitting on the sofa dressed in her pyjamas with a man who is not her husband, it is, to my old-fashioned ideas, rather peculiar."

The Dunlop-Southport £2,000 (\$8,000) professional golf tournament will not be held next year because the Southport publicity and attractions committee feels it can spend the money to better advantage in advertising the coast town as a holiday resort. First year of the competition, in 1931, cost Southport £800. This year's outlay was £1,479.

It took Bermondsey (London) councillors a long time to find out but they've made up their minds to ban professional wrestling bouts staged by private promoters at the borough's hall. They found that "kicking, biting and punching tactics" amounted to "objectionable behavior" on behalf of the mat-men.

Jack Crump, secretary of the British Amateur Athletic Board, says British coaches are as good as those in any other country. Lack of food and facilities to train are the greatest handicaps to the progress of British athletes, he says.
