"A lot of people," mused the Old Timer this morning, "get the idea that Communists and Socialists are just reformers in a hurry.

"They aren't, of course. They are each following a complete political philosophy, and such reforms as they advocate are for the most part just means of gaining wider influence so that they can bring the people to acceptance of the rest of their doctrines, which do not constitute reform at all but a complete revolution in the social system.

"You only have to watch proceedings in a country such as Czechoslovakia to see how it operates. The Communists and some of the Socialist parties were after reforms in a hurry-supposedly. They worked together, got some key positions in the government, started to brand everyone who opposed them in the slightest degree as reactionaries. Then when they judged the time was ripe they announced discovery of a plot for FOR SALE-4-roomed modern

the over-throw of the government by these socalled reactionaries, sent out their police and 'action committees' to arrest and purge all opposition, and grabbed complete control.

"Now all judges, politicians, editors, school teachers and so forth have to be Communists, or else. There is complete control of the press, the radio, education, even the Boy Scout movement. Democracy in Czechoslovakia is finished, and it will be a long time before this freedom-loving people knows the breath of freedom again.

"They preached reform, but what they wanted was a dictatorship, their dictatorship, and the people who listened to them should know better now, and so should people everywhere.

THE TAYLOR-Modern lines distinguish this six room, two-story house, the TAYLOR, Pictured here it is finished in wide clapboard laid 8, to the weather to the top of the parapet around the second story sun deck.
