tricky job, beset by the possibility of mishaps that may result in the loss of large quantities of fish and even of the expensive seine net itself.

When a skipper surrounds a school with his seine, he must take great care not to close the top of the net too tightly. This would suffocate the herring and they would die. The weight of perhaps 1,000 tons of dead fish on the bottom of the seine would tear it. Then there is the possibility that the school might "sound", or decide to head, en masse, for the bottom. In cases of sounding, schools of herring have taken the seine down with them. The net has been returned to the surface later by the




