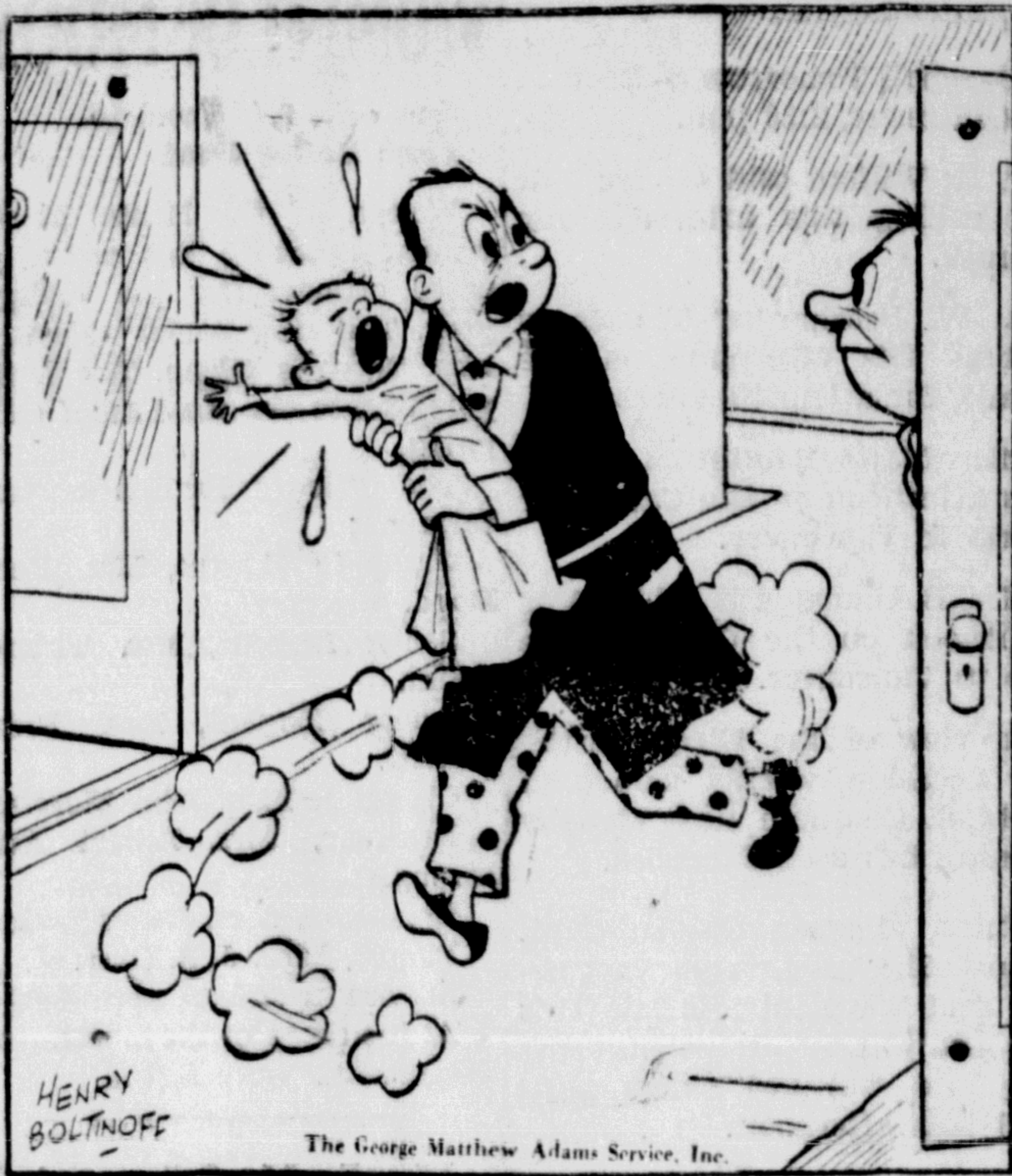

### High School Takes Lead

Students Defeat Battery With Good Exhibition of Gilhuly Cup Football

In the second game of the Gilhuly Cup football competition last evening a much-improved High School team won deservedly from 120th Battery. Final score of the hard-fought contest was two goals to one.

Opening exchanges were even with both teams showing good combination. Wart's pass gave Hardy a good chance and Boulter had to be good to stop the latter's shot. At the other end Sharp tested Morgan with a fine long drive. From a free kick Veitch scored with a grand shot to put the Battery one up. High School fought back and Morgan cleared twice, one being a very good save from Bob Currie. Holkestad and Wart attacked but Sunberg cleared and then, from Olsen's through pass, Wilson went in close to beat Morgan for the equalizer. High did most of the pressing and Owens gave Morgan a hot hand. Veitch sent his forwards to the attack but Olsen sent them back and half-time came with the score tied at one each.

Although playing uphill the students were the first to attack in second half and Morgan had to run out to clear. High School right wing of Bob Currie and Mercer went ahead but Ferguson cleared and then James headed away into safety. Holkestad and Parkhouse combined nicely but Wynn broke it up. A Gomez was through until Sharp blocked him and High School was hard pressed for a time but steady defence held safe. Then Morgan was tested several times.
