


Sport Shots

The others showed ability in flashes but failed to drive through. Nearly half the team consisted of Williams's, there being five on the team.

Boulter was sound but was not severely tested. Eby and John Wilson coped with most of the attacks successfully. Olsen played his usual bustling game and got through a lot of work. Mazzoni was very sound using his head to good advantage. Alex Gomez was also very good and crossed several balls into the opposing goalmouth. The forward line was good with Armstrong the sparkplug. He and Murray were always dangerous. Pavlikis did not show up as well as usual but opened out the game. Ford and Pat Wilson were good on the right wing.

Council Is Dissatisfied

In a question and answer period at last night's meeting of the city council, Ald. T. B. Black called attention to the council of items appearing in the local press by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and the provincial Department of Public Works dealing with the condition of the road between the city limits and Galloway Rapids Bridge.

Ald. Black said transportation companies were caused countless additional expense through the condition of that piece of road. He said he was more inclined to agree with the Chamber's statement about impassability of the road rather than with the provincial department denying it. He suggested the department be asked to look into the question with the idea of bringing about improvements.

A motion asking the investigation be carried out passed unanimously. The investigation will include the stretch a mile beyond the bridge.
