parties this summer. The two main events are July 8 and 22. Among the 7,000 guests St., June 17. to be invited on both occasions will be the Prime Minister and cabinet, members of the House of Lords, the Diplomatic Corps, the Lord Mayor of London, mayors of towns and boroughs, famous judges and counsel, high officers of the Church of England and the three services.

High commissioners of Commonwealth countries resident in London will also be invited, in addition to large numbers of visitors from overseas.

Applications from Canadian visitors wishing to attend either of the July parties must reach the Canadian High Commissioner in London by the end of this

There will also be three presentation garden parties at the Palace May 12 and 13 and June 11, replacing the evening courts at which debutantes were presented in pre-war times

"No further applications for these three events can now be considered," a Canada House official said. "The lists are closed, but I can say that many Canadian visitors will be presented."


