TERRACE—Two blasts of the fire siren awakened the sleeping town at 4:40 a.m. Sunday and the wall of it had hardly died away when the fire engine came speeding down Lakelse Avenue, down Kalum Street and south of the tracks to the farm of George Hipp. Here the old homestead was going up in flames but the services of the firemen were not needed. Apparently, it was Mr. Hipp's way of disposing of his old home. Then being outside the village boundaries, he obtained permission from the forestry department to dispose of the building by fire.
