PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO

April 23, 1923 Minister of Lands, T. D. Pattullo arrived here from Ottawa filled with optimism for the future of the city. He said that the current lull in business was only temporary and that the city could be confident of a bright future.

A frame roundhouse, built to replace one destroyed by fire, would be ready for use by May 1, J. W. McAuley, C.N.R. locomotive foreman said.

Ninety automobile licenses had been taken out and 56 driver's licenses issued during the first three and a half months of 1923. A. C. Minty, chief of the provincial police force announced.

April 23, 1913 The Vancouver News-Advertiser planned to devote six pages of a special issue to Prince Rupert. The local Board of Trade agreed to purchase \$75 worth of copies.

The Federal grain commissioner was invited by Mayor Pattullo to visit this port while on a tour of the coast during the summer. A large party of German business men who were touring Canada also were invited.

The Board of Trade protested a proposed Third Avenue site for a new post office and a petition was circulated to that effect. It was to be forwarded to Ottawa when the signatures were completed.
