DRIVING B.C. OUT

VANCOUVER-Attorney General Gordon Wismer today charged that discriminatory freight rates were driving the people of British Columbia, in sentiment at least, out of Confederation. Mr. Wismer opened before the Board of Transport Commissioners the first full-scale battle against the so-called mountain differential in railway freight rates since 1922. He said that the railway freight conceived as an instrument of furthering national unity but now discriminatory rates had created a "mental attitude" of secession in British Columbia.

# RUSS MIGHT ON

Seattle Newspaper Sees Preparations for Hostilities

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer in a review of the situation in the north, with a reference to the possibility of hostilities,
