SPIRITUAL MATURITY

Seen By Presbyterian Pastor
As One of World's Needs

In crisis of war there had
been some retention of social
vision and spiritual insight but
unfortunately, there appears to
have been a regression in the
post-war period but, neverthe-
less, there were signs of turn-
ing of the tide today, said Rev.
G. E. Sendall, pastor of First
Presbyterian Church, in his
morning sermon yesterday. He
called for a more steadfast at-
titude in practice of the prin-
ciples of right and advocated a
more militant church. His sub-
ject "Maturity," Mr. Sendall
felt that the tendency today was
to stress physical and intellec-
tual maturity instead of moral
and spiritual maturity. He de-
plored a tendency to worship
the god of Mammon. Why should
countries of the world be starv-
ing while others had plenty and
declined supply because of mon-
etary considerations? Did the
world have to have a depres-
sion to bring it to its senses?
Mr. Sendall saw one hopeful
sign of changing attitude in the
fact that the best-selling novels
today were those with religious
factors.
