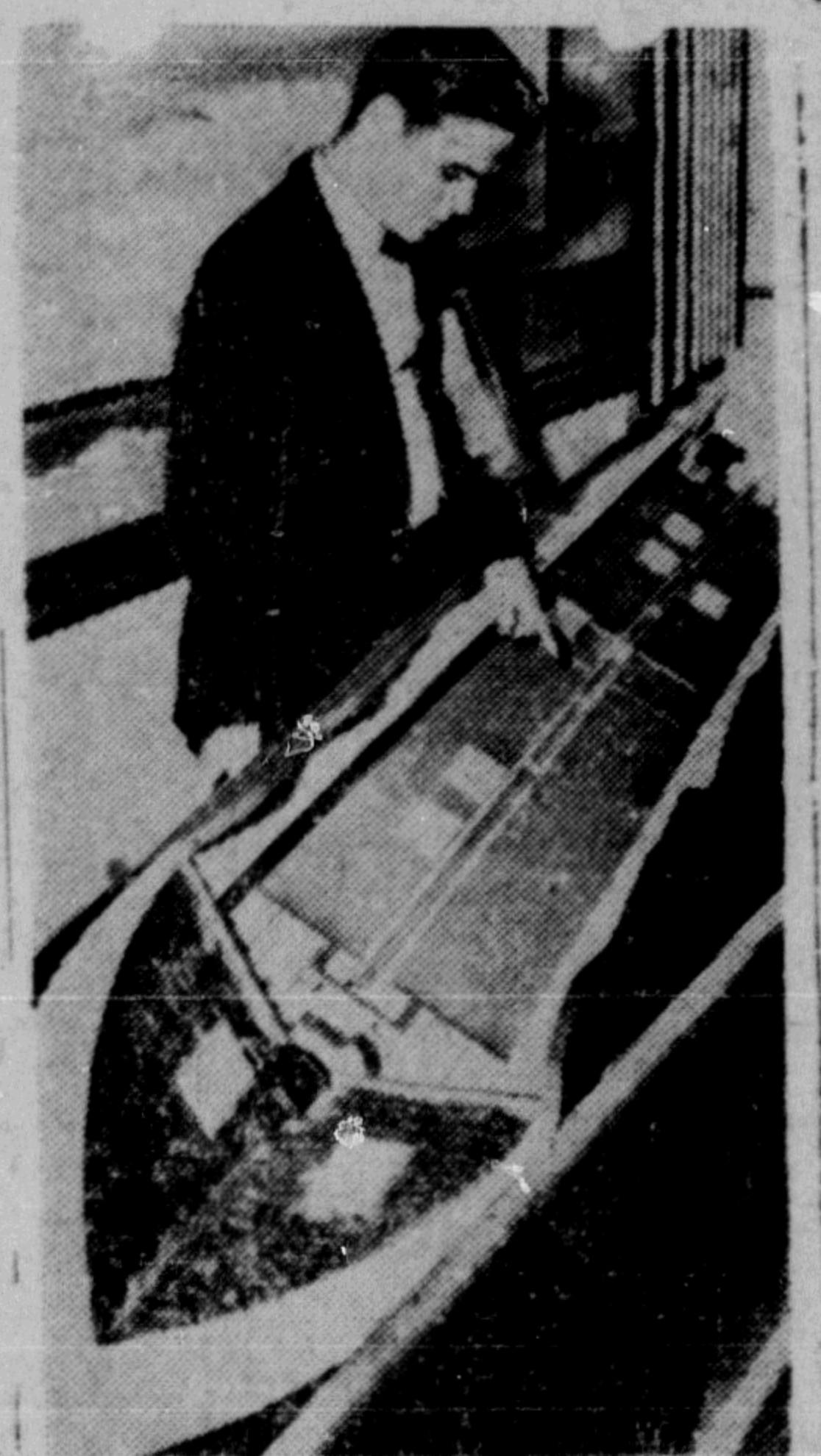

Coal Short In Long Cold Snap

WEATHER REPORT: COLD, SNOW, RAIN—Three trans-Canada busses are stalled on the Hope-Princeton highway as snows blanket British Columbia, halting transportation. Mountain slides have contributed to the blocking of roads.



Abnormally heavy demand against normal supplies have exhausted reserves of coal in local fuel yards and arriving supplies are hardly keeping up with orders. Dealers are today urging their customers to conserve the stocks in their bins. Lump coal is practically out while limited supplies of egg and nut are still available as well as some Bulkley Valley coal. Stoker coal is in adequate supply.
Street conditions and the sharp weather have been making the delivery service slow and difficult.
Limited supplies of coal came in for local yards on a freight train which arrived last night after having been blocked by snow conditions on the lower Skeena line.
Oil, the other principal form of heating fuel in Prince Rupert, is plentiful supply, local oil companies report, although they have been taxed making delivery of quickened orders.

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 9
Tariff Rating Rates and Rules for Electric Service at Prince Rupert, B.C.
Continuation of Service
At any time in the event of a shortage of water supply, whether actual or apprehended by officials of the Company, or in the event of a breakdown or failure of generating, transmitting or distributing plant, lines or equipment, the Company, after receiving, either verbally or in writing, the consent of the Public Utilities Commission, shall have the right to require any customer or classes of customers or all its customers, until notice of termination of the requirement is given or discontinuation of service is made, to discontinue the use of energy for any purpose or purposes or for all purposes or to reduce in any specified degree or to their consumption of energy for any purpose or purposes or for all purposes.
Any such requirement may be communicated to any customer or customers or all customers by either or both of the following means, that is to say, by public notices in the press and by causing announcements to be made over the radio, and may be communicated to any individual customer by either or both of the following means, that is to say, by notice in writing (either sent through the mail or left at the premises where electric service is required, or served personally) and by oral communication. Any notice of the termination of any requirement may be communicated similarly.
If in the opinion of any official or the Company any customer of the Company has failed to comply with any requirement of the Company communicated as aforesaid, notice shall be at liberty, after notice to the customer communicated as aforesaid, to discontinue electric service to such customer.
The Company shall not be liable for any loss of or suffered by any customer for or by reason of the making of any such requirement or the discontinuance of electric service to him as aforesaid.
