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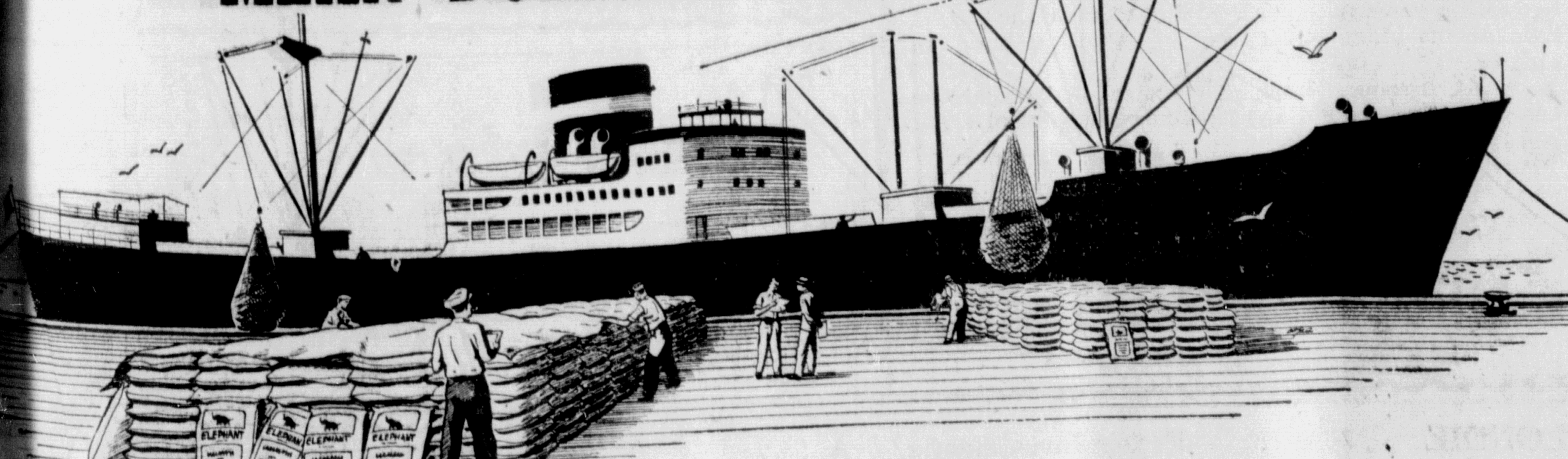


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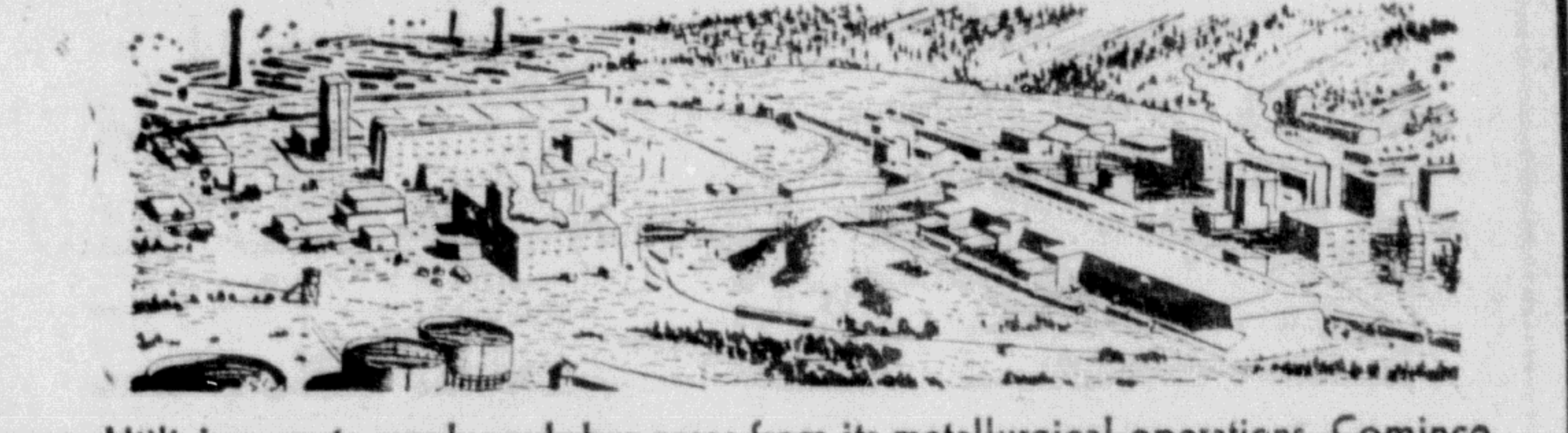
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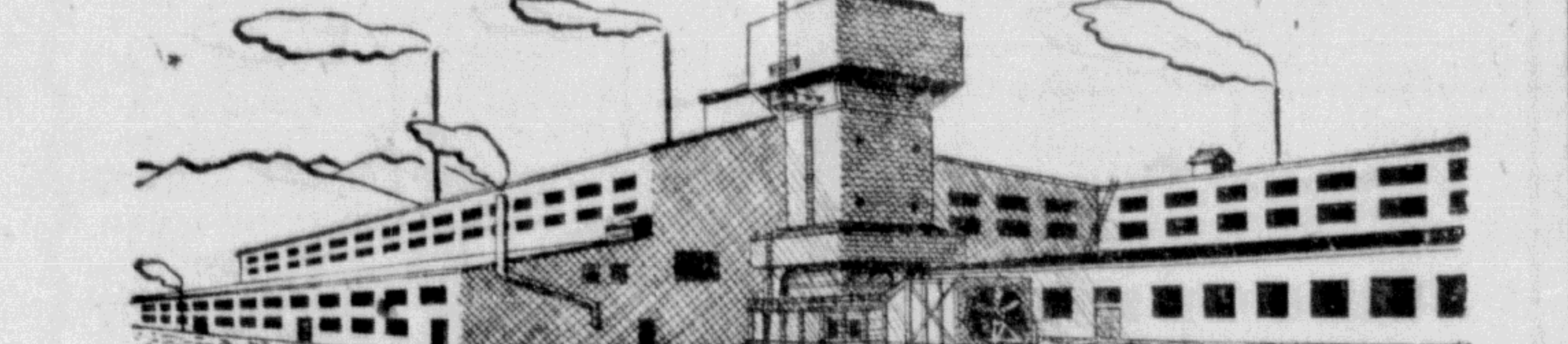


CANADA'S dollar shortage is helped substantially by the great quantities of chemical fertilizers produced and exported to United States by Cominco and paid for in American dollars.
