SATURDAY SERMON

REALITY OF GOD
 By Archdeacon E. Hodson, St. Peter's, Seal Cove

St. Paul had been driven from the cities of Thessalonica and from Berea by the jealousy of the Jewish factions and has come to the city of Athens for safety.

He finds the city wholly given up to idolatry and his ardent soul must go into action. "His spirit was stirred within him."

Athens was a university city of old world culture and refinement but it was stocked with thirty thousand idols, many of them magnificent works of art. But Paul is no mere sight-seer. While others could only see Grecian handiwork, he saw the city solidly given up to idolatry.

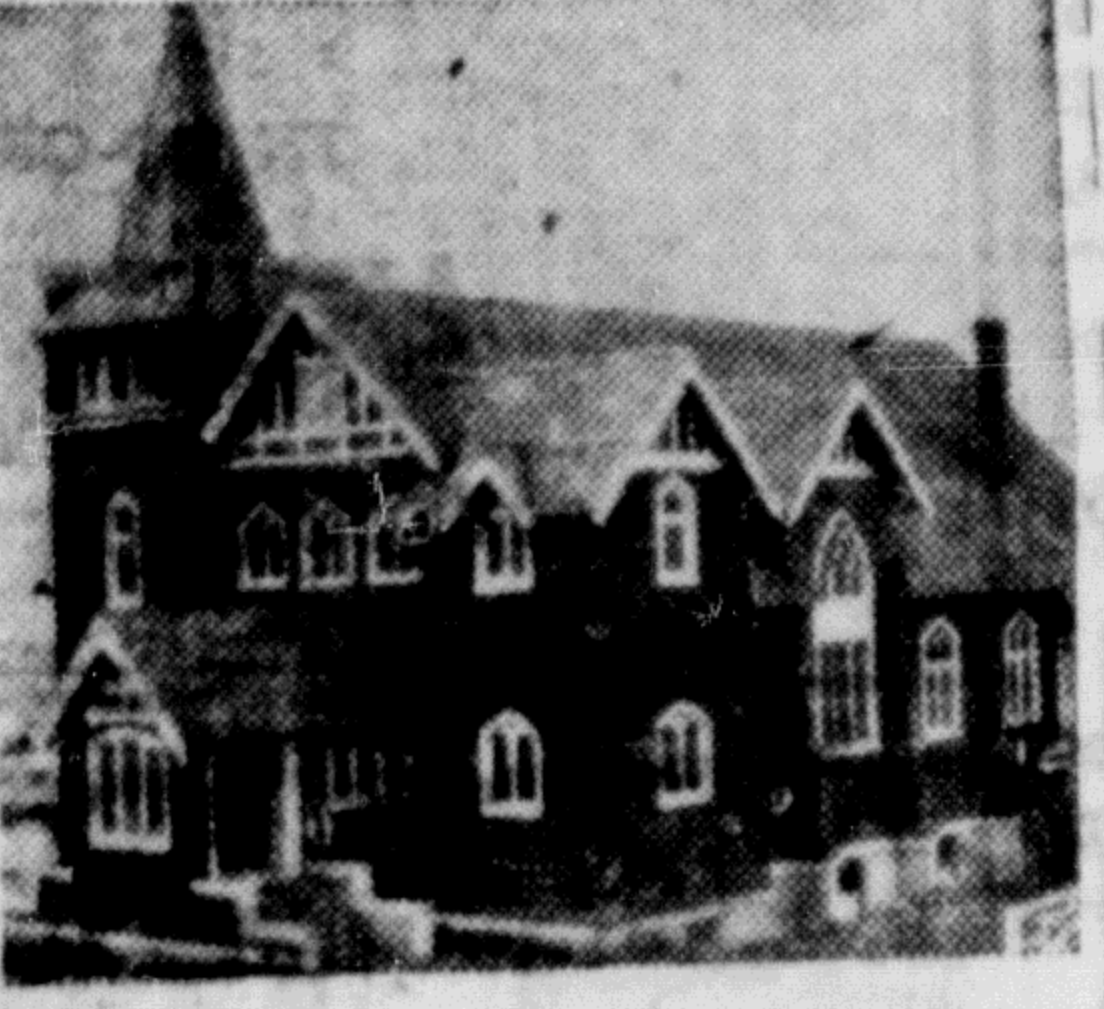
So Paul mounts the pulpit in the midst of Mars Hill, the meet and debating place of the leading men of Athens.

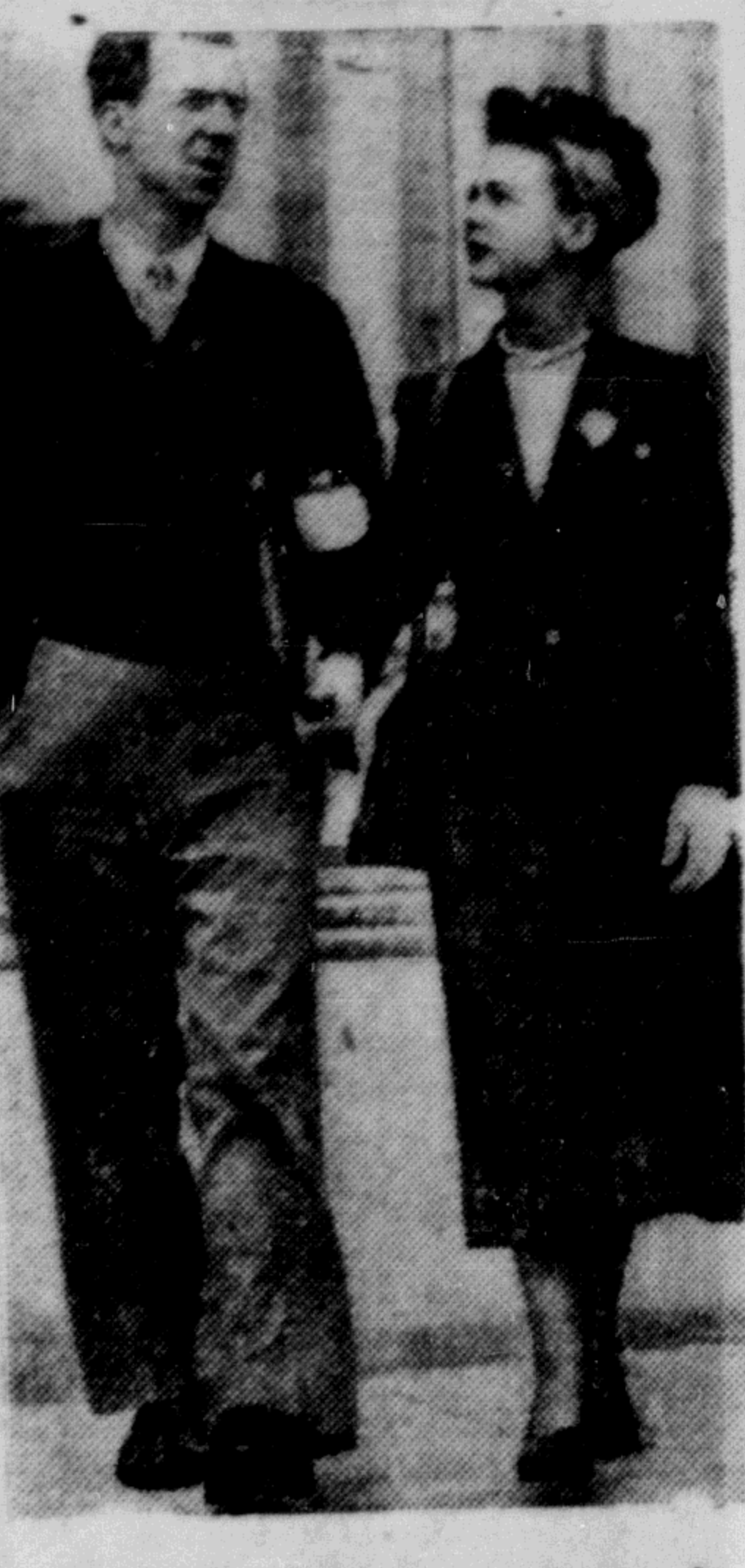
