## Antrobus Is Cancer Head

Annual Meeting of Prince Rupert Association

Rev. F. Antrobus was elected president of the Prince Rupert division of the Canadian Cancer Society at the annual meeting held in the Civic Centre yesterday afternoon. He was secretary and campaign organizer during the past two years.

The new vice-president, Mrs. A. Holbrook, read a report compiled on the provincial convention held in September at Vancouver, at which she was a delegate.

Other members of the new executive are Mrs. G. V. Hanley, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. J. S. Black, Mrs. William Murdoch, Mrs. J. C. Gilker, Mrs. Frederick Antrobus, Mrs. William Rothwell, Mrs. D. R. Barclay, directors.

Other officers appointed to the board of directors are Dr. Duncan Black, honorary president; D. C. Stevenson, Mrs. Neville Gerrard, Mrs. Thelma Dawson (Vancouver). One local doctor and a social service worker are to be appointed.

Due to poor attendance a motion was made to have in the year only two public meetings of the local branch, in spring and fall. It was also moved that, if delegates from city organizations could be present at the Cancer Association public meetings, attendance might improve. The secretary was asked to write to these organizations inviting delegates.

After the minutes of the last meeting were read by Rev. Antrobus, the retiring secretary, the treasurer's report was given by Mrs. William Murdoch, Mrs. William Rothwell, past president, was in the chair.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. Rothwell for the service she had given as president of the local association for the past two years. Acknowledgement was also made to Mrs. Murdoch and Mr. Antrobus for their work with

the executive over the past two years.

### HIGH MORTALITY

One out of every eight persons will die of cancer according to the film "Battle Against Cancer" presented by Donald Forward to the society at the close of the meeting. Although, according to the film, there were more casualties from cancer than war fatalities between Pearl Harbor and V-J Day with one person dying every three minutes, science had progressed in its treatment of the disease.

Warning and illustration of danger signals were explained in the film to facilitate recognition and immediate treatment of the disease. Protection against "quack" cures were made by showing that there are only three recognized treatments for the disease: surgery, radium and x-ray.

## Timely Recipes

### GALA FRUIT PUDDING

1 cup prunes  
1 cup seeded raisins  
1 cup seedless raisins  
1 cup finely chopped suet  
1 cup brown sugar (packed)  
1 cup light molasses  
1 cup grated carrot  
1 cup grated potato  
1/2 cup sliced candied cherries  
1/2 cup finely cut citron  
1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon cloves  
1/2 teaspoon allspice  
Rinse prunes, cover with water and boil 10 minutes. Drain and cool. Cut prunes from pits into small pieces. Rinse and drain raisins. Mix suet with sugar, molasses, carrot and potato. Add fruits and citron; combine with flour sifted with baking powder, salt and spice. Mix thoroughly. Pour into greased cans or molds. Cover molds, place in kettle containing sufficient hot water to cover three-quarters of mold. Cover kettle and boil about 3 hours. Replenish hot water as needed. Serve warm with desired sauce. Serves 12 to 14.
