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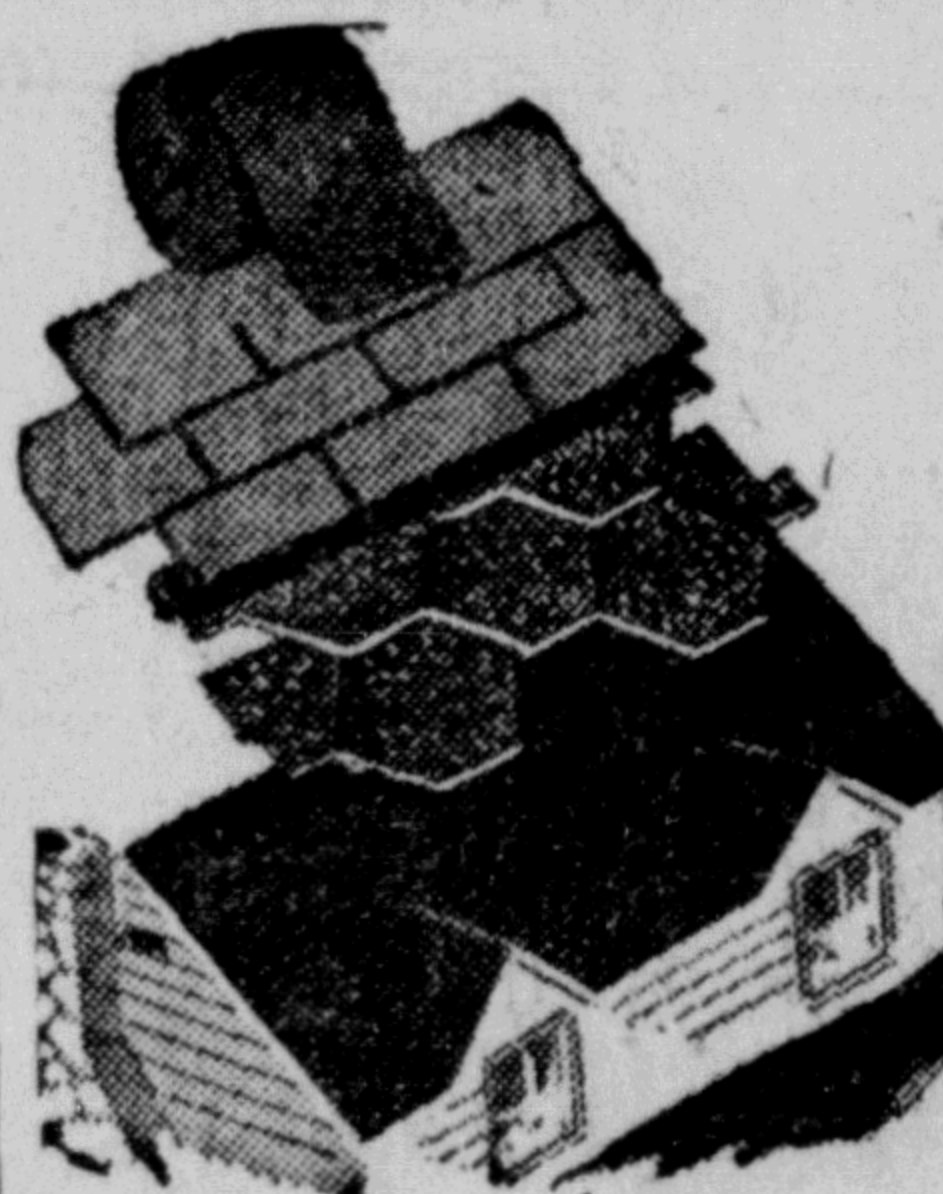


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Sport Shots

The hitherto untied Watson
Island baseball team came
through Thursday night to tie
the game against Commercial
at the end of the scheduled
seven innings, only to lose in
the extra eighth to the better or-
ganized hotelmen. Final score was
5-4.

E. Warren, first batter for the
Islanders, bunted the first pitch-
ed ball for a safe trip to first
base. B. Wagner took a walk
when hit by a pitched ball. Then
Gun-Na-Noot came through with
a two base hit to score Warren,
but Wagner was tagged out
trying to get to third. Tex Car-
rell and Perreault both struck out
to retire the side.

Shier, for the Commercial
fled out to first base. Bruce Si-
mondson popped up to the pit-
cher and Miner Simondson was
out on a play from pitcher to
first base to end the inning with
the newcomers leading 1-0.

Wong struck out to begin the
second stanza. Parker followed
with a hit and stole second. Mag-

nus fled out to centre field. Lefty
McDonald, came through with a
clean hit but lost its advantage
when Parker was tagged out
trying to come home when Miner
Simondson made a beautiful
throw from centre field to the
catcher.

Sid Scherk tied the score with
a long drive to left field that
took him to third base. He came
home on the same play. Ewart
was out on a play from pitcher
to first base. Marshall got to
first base on a hit, but got no
further as D. Scherk fled out to
first base and Spring struck out.

Warren started the third with
a nice hit. He scored on a two
bagger by Wagner, who scored on
a hit by Gun-Na-Noot. The next
three batters went down on a
pop up to catcher, fly to first
base and a play from shortstop
to first respectively.

McKinnon went down on a
play from second to first but
Commercial came back as Shier
hit. He scored on a three base
hit by Bruce Simondson, who
was out trying to get home.
Minor Simondson hit but was
left on second when Scherk fled
out to left field.

First batter for the Islanders
in the fourth went down swing-
ing. Magnus hit a two bagger
and moved to third on an error

by second baseman. He was
caught trying to steal home. Mc-
Donald was called out when he
stepped out of the batter's box
to bunt.

Ewart started the ball rolling
for the hotelmen with a hit. He
stole second. Marshall went down
swinging. Doug Scherk scored
him with a hit, but died on
third as Spring and McKinnos
were put out on plays from sec-
ond and pitcher to first. The in-
ning ended with the score tied at
3-3.

Watson Island went down one-
two-three in the fifth. Wagner
hit but was caught trying to
stretch it to a two bagger.

Shier hit for Commercial in
the bottom of the fifth and
moved to second on an over-
throw. Bruce Simondson struck
out. Big brother Miner scored
Shier with a clean hit. S. Scherk
fled out to centre field and the
side was retired when Ewart was
struck out at first. Commercial
led 4-2.

Ludvigson, replacing Carrell,
struck out. Perreault got to first
through a pitcher's error, stole
second and scored on a hit by
Wong to tie the ball game. Parker
struck out and Magnus was
beaten by a throw from third to
first.

Both sides went down one-
two-three in the seventh. The
game went into an extra inning
with Watson Island trying hard
to get that extra run. First bat-
ter struck out. Ludvigson hit and
Perreault was walked. Wong
struck out. Perreault was tagged
out by Bruce Simondson when
Parker hit a short one to second
base. Bruce was badly hurt on
the play.

Scherk for Commercial got to
first by a second baseman's error
and moved on to second on an
overthrow. He scored on a long
drive by Ewart to win the game.
