been successful in operating with in the budget during the year. It had been the endeavour to give the best possible service and, in that connection, there had been co-operation from staff and medical profession.

Continuing shortage of nurses had made it impossible to employ available hospital facilities to the full. This year a new heating system would have to be considered as the present plant was now at capacity.

Building of a new nurses' home had been now embarked upon. The provincial government had given assurance of paying one-third of the cost. It was anticipated there would be another one-third from the Federal government which would leave the other one-third to be paid for locally. (Excavation for the new Nurses' Home started yesterday.)

Advent of hospital insurance had revolutionized hospital finance. The year had been one of testing—trial and error—with increased public demand and increased cost.

of the bylaws, T. W. Brown inquired why doctors and clergymen were not eligible to be elected members of the board. The explanation given by Managing Secretary D. C. Stevenson was that, to permit this, might result in a professional group gaining control of the hospital.

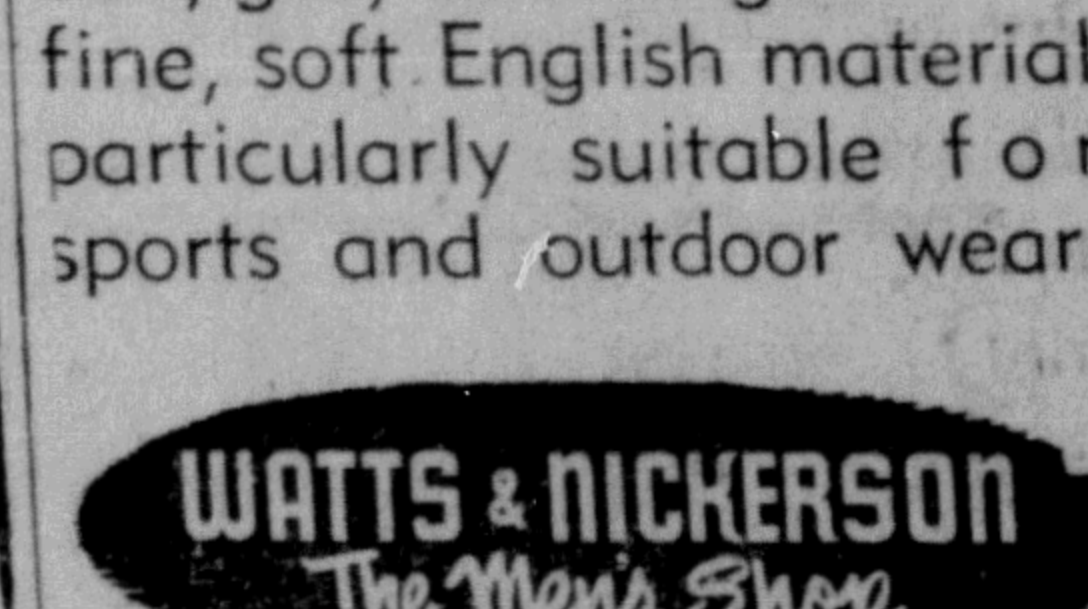
