

INDONESIAN REVOLT

JAKARTA, Indonesia-A new revolt against the Central Indonesian government was reported today to have broken out in the state of East Indo nesia. Reliable neutral sources said separatists on the Island of Ambon, traditional capital of the Moluccan Islands had proclaimed an independent state of the south-Moluccas. The Separatists included local authorities and were supported by Indonesian soldiers of the Netherlands East Indian Army waiting transfer to the Indonesian Federal Army.
