### DON SCHERK, WHO LED JUNIORS, TOPS INTERMEDIATE SCORERS

Don Scherk of Bo-Me-Hi duplicated his 1946-47 performance and topped his second scoring title in two years by scoring 143 points to pace the Intermediate Basketball League during the past season. The Bo-Me-Hi forward earned his leadership by a 13-point margin over his teammate Doug Shier. He also scored the most field goals, 63.

Doug Shier led all the way in free throws and attempts. He scored 28 out of 60. Ole Slatta of Fashion Footwear had the best free throw percentage by scoring 20 out of 38 for 53 percent. Sid Scherk, Merchants centre, was the league leader in personal fouls with 52, followed by Harry Menzies, Fashion Footwear forward, with 45.

Game records show Port Edward scoring 56 points which was high for a single game. Bo-Me-Hi and Morgan's combined for 83 points, tops for a single game. Arthur Gurney of Port Edward scored the most points in a game, 25, and the most field goals, 12. Slatta of Fashion made the most free throws in one game, 7 out of 8. Merchants committed the most fouls in a game, 24. Fashion Footwear and Port Edward made the most fouls in a game, 38.

Three players scored 20 points in a game. Bo-Me-Hi's Jim Flaten scored 20 points early in the season. Slatta scored 20 for Fashion and Arthur Gurney scored 25 for Port Edward.

Bo-Me-Hi played their season through undefeated which will be a record hard to beat in future years. Morgan's had the losing streak of 11 games.

## SHORT SPORT

Do you know how to watch a hockey game? Chances are you don't. Just read what Tony Allan of the Winnipeg Tribune says: "Look around sometime when the rink is about half full.

Most of the crowd will be grouped 'front and centre' while only a discerning few will be sitting where they get a proper perspective. Lots of people, who have been going to hockey games for years, still have the idea that a good seat is one at centre ice—where nothing of importance takes place—but they can't see what happens around the net, and they watch every scoring play from behind.

In the days of the three-man rush, there was something to see at centre ice, Allan claimed. But those days are gone forever. With the present vogue for pressure hockey, the game is played almost entirely inside the bluelines. One team shoots the puck into the corner, then attempts to bottle up its opponents behind the blue line. Any mid-ice skirmishes are purely coincidental.

Accordingly, the regulars who turn up for every game no matter what teams are playing, the scouts and any idle hockey players in the house—you'll find most of them squatting behind the screens at either end. They like to see the plays coming at them and to get a close up of those goal-mouth scrambles.

Then, Allan said, there is another school which prefers the corners—and either blue line is a pretty fair vantage point. They get an angle shot of the plays coming towards them, and a first-class view of what happens in the corners or directly in front of the net. Of course, Allan admits that when you're sitting behind the screen, or in one of the corners, there'll be the odd game in which all the goals are scored at the far end. But, he said, over a season's play you'll get your fair share of action.


