**AGREEMENT IN  
FIREMEN'S WAGES**

Increase in Condition Upon  
Cost of Living Fluctuation

Recommendation of a con-  
ciliation board that members  
of the city fire department be  
given a 12 percent wage in-  
crease was approved condition-  
ally by city council in a closed  
committee-of-the-whole session.  
Condition contained in the  
approval is that the 12 percent  
increase be lowered to 10 per-  
cent should the official cost-of-  
living index drop five points be-  
low its December 31, 1948, level  
at any time during the year.  
The conciliation board, which  
sat here more than a month ago,  
recommended that all classes of  
city fire fighters, with the ex-  
ception of probationers, receive  
a 12 percent wage increase. The  
increase would boost a first-  
class fireman's salary from \$209  
to \$224 a month.  
The firemen last week indi-  
cated their willingness to abide  
by the board's recommendation.  
Reason for the fluctuating  
clause suggested by city council  
is that a 12 percent increase is  
two percent greater than that  
granted to other city employes  
in their 1949 working agree-  
ments. Civic Employees' Union  
obtained a general 10 percent  
increase in negotiations early  
this year.  
Should the official cost of  
living index show a five-point  
drop during the year, the fire-  
men should then be brought  
into line with the other civic  
employees, the council members  
insist.  
The matter was discussed in  
the closed committee-of-the-  
whole at request of Alderman  
T. B. Black.
